**The Runner**  
By Malcolm Boyd. 1973. Pp. 162. Doubleday & Co., Inc., Garden City, N.Y.

"I can remember when I ran inside a maze, in crooked lines and obsessed by fear". So states the sinful runner (man), who refused to have for his partner Jesus, the Master Runner, in the race of life. Such is the thesis for Malcolm Boyd's

book, *The Runner*, in which he removes the abstract connotation surrounding the very name of the Christ, and reveals Him as real, on a person-to-person basis.

There ensues a series of dialogues between Jesus and modern-day characters concerning how they relate God to their own lives on their own terms. The rock singer tells his side of the story, along with other students who express their views on prayer, sexual morality, marijuana, war, race relations, poverty, etc. Jesus is never too busy to listen to both sides of their problems, and agrees with them on many points. However, like a magnet, he pulls them back to God and the truths which are basic.

The beauty of *The Runner* lies in its fresh, direct approach. There are no pat, stereotyped answers. The Gospel becomes alive, using modern terminology. The abstract Jesus disappears, and in his place appears *The Runner*, our partner in the race of life.

## food news & cues

Some main dish recipes are more economical than others. But cost is not the only factor to consider in making comparisons. The contribution of the main dish to the meal also needs to be taken into account. This week we are suggesting Pork in Barbecue Sauce (with variations) served with cooked cabbage and panned apple wedges. Have a Peach Bavarian Pie for dessert.

**Pork in Barbecue Sauce**  
Pork shoulder chops (1/2 inch thick) 6-about 2 lbs.

**Barbecue Sauce**  
Spanish-style tomato sauce, 8 oz can.  
1/2 cup minced onion  
1/4 cup catsup  
2 tbsps. vinegar  
2 tbsps. brown sugar  
1 tbsps. prepared mustard

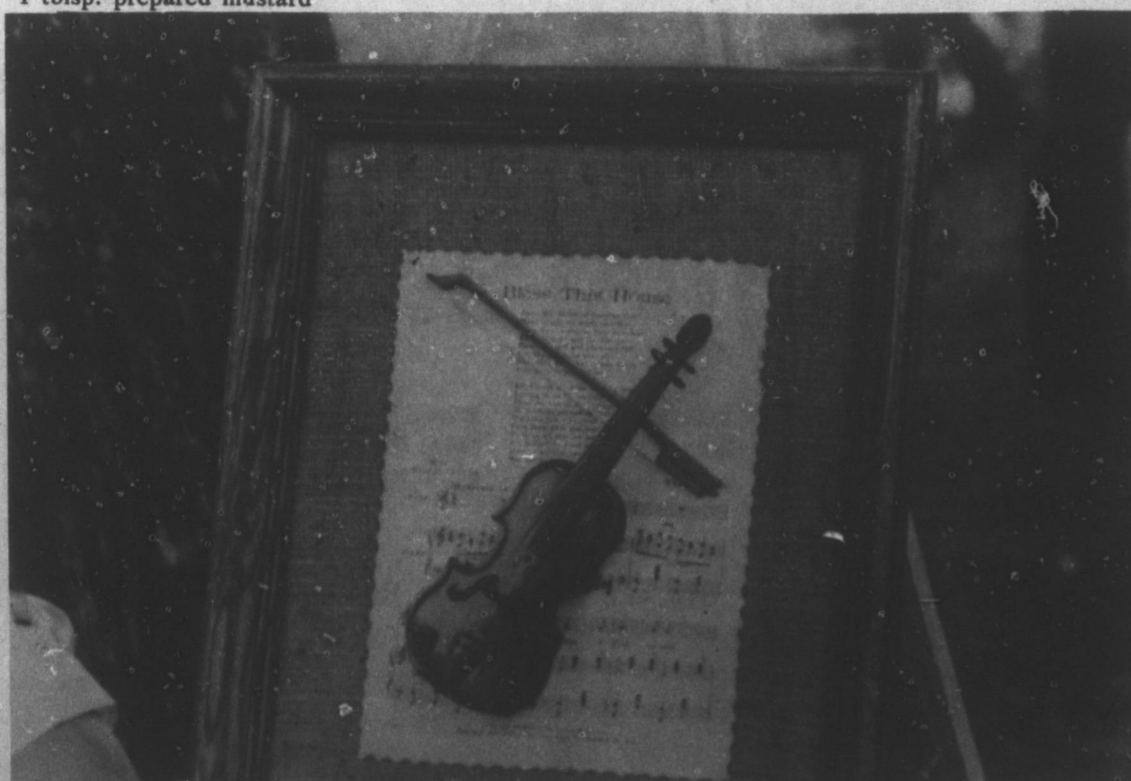
1 tbsps. Worcestershire sauce  
1 tsp. salt  
1/8 tsp. pepper

Prepare chops as for pan-fried pork chops, brown only. Drain off fat. Combine sauce ingredients and pour over meat. Simmer, covered, for 45 minutes. NOTE: In place of fried pork, use 3 cups cooked pork shoulder chunks, if desired. VARIATION: Chicken or turkey in barbecue sauce...In place of pork shoulder, use fried chicken or 3 cups cooked turkey chunks or slices.

**Peach Bavarian Pie**  
1 pkg. (3 oz) Orange Gelatin  
1/4 cup sugar  
Dash of salt  
1 cup boiling water  
1/2 cup cold water  
2 tbsps. lemon juice  
1 envelope Whipped Topping

Mix  
1/2 cup cold milk  
1/4 tsp. almond extract  
1 cup chopped sweetened fresh peaches, drained\*\*  
1 baked 9-inch pie shell, cooled  
\*\*Or use 1 pkg. (12 oz) Sliced Peaches, thawed, chopped and drained.

Dissolve gelatin, sugar, and salt in boiling water. Add cold water and lemon juice. Chill until slightly thickened. Meanwhile prepare whipped topping mix with milk as directed on package, using 1/4 tsp. almond extract instead of the vanilla. Fold prepared whipped topping and peaches into the thickened gelatin. Pour into pie shell. Chill until firm. Garnish with additional prepared whipped topping and sliced peaches before serving, if desired.
