½ cup shredded American cheese

Combine beef and breadcrumbs, eggs, ¼ cup tomato sauce, salt, chili powder and cayenne. Press into a 9 inch pie pan; bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes. Top with the thawed mixed vegetables; add remainder of tomato sauce and continue baking for 30 minutes. Sprinkle shredded cheese over top and bake until cheese melts. (4 to 6 servings.)

ORANGE SALAD

- 1 small whip topping
- 1 small cottage cheese
- 1 small pkg. orange jello (dry)
- 1 small can mandarin oranges (drained)

Mix jello, cottage cheese and oranges, then fold in whip topping and chill for two hours.

RASPBERRY-VANILLA CREAM

- 1-6 oz. pkg. raspberry jello
- 2½ cups boiling water
- 2 med. bananas
- ¼ cup lemon juice

1 qt. vanilla ice cream
Mix gelatin with boiling water; cool slightly. Mash bananas and sprinkle lemon juice over them. Stir bananas and ice cream into the gelatin and stir until ice cream is melted. Pour into individual molds, serving dishes, or a large (2 qt.) mold. Chill until set. Yield 12 servings.

CHOCOLATE COCONUT DROPS

- ½ cup sweetened condensed milk
 - 1 square (1 oz) unsweetened chocolate
 - 1/8 tsp. salt
 - 1½ cup shredded coconut
 - ½ tsp. vanilla
- Put milk, chocolate and salt in top of double boiler. Cook over rapidly boiling water, stirring often until thick (10 min). Remove from heat and stir in coconut and vanilla. Drop by teaspoonfuls on well greased baking sheet (1 inch apart). Bake 350 degrees 10-12 min. Remove from pan at once!
