LADY
By Thomas Tryon. 1974. Pp.329. Alfred A. Knopf, Inc., Publishers.

Lady, a new suspense novel by Thomas Tryon, is a female Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde story. Except, in this case, the main character drinks from the vial of revenge and, in her own words, "lives in Hell thereafter."

Leading a double life (both open and secret), Lady Harleigh is adored by everyone in a small puritanical New England town, where she

reigns as a figure of glamour and elegance. But all is not sweetness and light. Murder and evil lurk in the shadows, to be concealed only by the lighthearted gaiety of the widow, Lady. Assuming that her laughter is a mask for a broken heart, the townspeople are most sympathetic. But when they discover that her gaiety is for real as she leads a double life, their anger knows no bounds. It is hard for them to accept the fact that their idol has feet of clay.

The author bases his novel on the fact that Lady is a victim of circumstance, and tries to justify her actions accordingly. The result is a character study of slow deterioration, with emphasis on murder and revenge. Woven into the plot is a bizarre romance which is chilling and unconvincing, as Lady seeks to establish the fact that it is not whom we love that is important, but only that we love.

Informal Winter Entertaining
