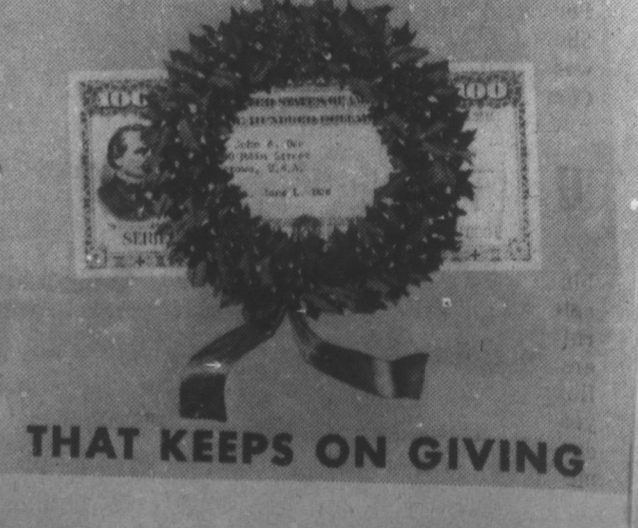
Choosing Snow Tires

Although there is no sure way to get positive traction under winter driving conditions, snow tires — that is, tires with deeper grooves than those on regular tires — can be up to 20 percent safer. Where regular tires would require about 188 feet to bring the car to a halt at 20 m.p.h. at 2 degree temperature, snow tires would need only about 168 feet. These special tires on your back wheels are an important safety plus, but can also be an inflation-fighter if you choose quality retread snow tire.

Here are a few tips on how to choose them from the Tire Retread Information Bureau:

1. You can get a good buy on retread snow tires — as on regular tires — because they are hal
2. Follow the rules for buying regular tires: Buy only from well established retreaders whose goods are high quality and guaranteed.
3. Don't mix radial tires on one axle with snow tires of bias-belt or bias-ply construction on the other axle.
4. After you've got them on, remember that changing weather changes tire inflation pressure. Tires lose about one pound of air pressure for every 10-degree drop in temperature.
