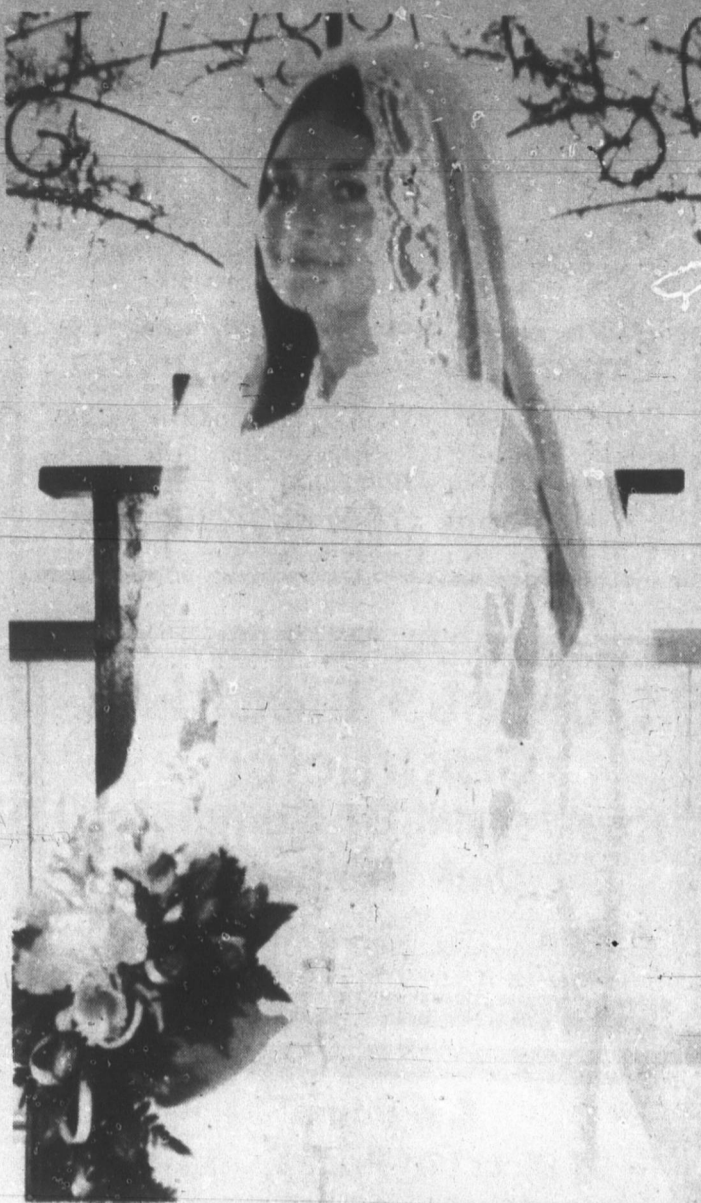
The bridal attendants wore flower garden print voile gowns with empire styling and puffed sleeves. They carried small nosegays of daisies and wore fresh daisies in their hair.

For And About Homemakers

More senior citizens die each year in home accidents than do members of any other age group. Many who survive accidents are left with serious injuries that make their lives far less enjoyable than they should be.

A bad situation, you say? Yes! But one that we can change if we take a close look at our homes and correct those things that cause accidents. We all know that our senses become less keen and our bodies less agile as we grow older. We also stay at home more. In fact, statistics tell us that 80 to 90 percent of the average retired person's time is spent in the home. Therefore, it makes sense to adapt our home environment to our changing physical needs.

AGE-PROOFING A HOME

The following suggestions for "age-proofing" the home are offered in the hope that they may help make those hard-earned retirement years as happy as they ought to be:

- Install sturdy, easy-to-grasp handrails along all steps.
- Light switches should be at both the top and bottom of interior stairs.
- Non-skid treads are desirable on stairs to prevent slipping.
- Place decals or grills on sliding glass doors.

--Install grab bars in the bathroom. (Sturdy towel bars are handy for grabbing in case of an emergency.)

--Use non-skid rubber mats or decals in the bottom of the bathtub.

--In the kitchen, use well-balanced pots with sturdy handles. Turn all pot handles toward the center of the range.

--Remember to turn off all stove burners and portable appliances when you have finished with them.

--Install a fire extinguisher in the kitchen.

--Do not work or cook in long flowing gowns or robes.

--Place furniture and be certain that it will be easy to get around without bumping into things.

--Furniture in hallways can be hazardous.

--Furniture should have rounded corners and edges to prevent bumps and bruises.

--Choose floor coverings that are as skid-resistant as possible.

--Wall-to-wall carpet is safer than area rugs. Scatter rugs can scatter YOU.

--Light switches should be within easy reach as you enter each room.

--Avoid using extension cords. They can cause falls as well as fires.
