#### SOME FACTS ABOUT **OLDER AMERICANS** U.S.Dept. HEW

In 1974, one in every 10 persons in the United States was 65 or older.

Between 1900 and 1974 the percentage of the U.S. population aged 65 and over more than doubled (4.1% in 1900 to 10.3% in 1974) while the total number of persons 65 and over increased about sevenfold (3 million in 1900 to 22 million in 1974.)

At present death rates, the older population is expected to increase to 31 million by the year 2000. If the present low birth rate continues, these 31 million will be about 11.7% of the total population which is estimated to be about 262 million.

A child born in 1900 could expect to live an average of about 47 years; a child born in 1973 could expect to live 24 years longer--an average of 71 years. The major part of the increase occurred because of reduced death rates for children and young adults. More people now reach old age, but then do not live much longer than did their ancestors who reached 65 in 1900.

At age 65, life expectancy is 15 years--13 years for men but 17 years for women.

Three-fifths of all of the deaths of older persons resulted from heart disease (45%) and cancer (16%).
