charged to your telephone. No charge will be made for calls to Directory Assistance placed from coin telephones or for calls to Directory Assistance outside the 704

Blind persons and those persons physically handicapped to the extent that they cannot use a telephone directory will not be charged for calls to Directory Assistance. To qualify for exemption from charging for Direc-

tory Assistance calls, certification of eligibility must be made to the telephone com-

The volume of calls to Directory Assistance has been steadily increasing each year and the charge for calls to Directory Assistance is intended to help reduce the growing volume of unnecessary calls and, in turn, reduce the continually climbing costs of providing this service. Under this plan, those customers who continue to call Directory Assistance will pay their share of the costs of providing this service.

# Wildlife Commission Sets Deer Seasons, Limits

A two-deer daily limit in the eastern part of the state was one of several changes in the hunting and trapping regulations adopted for the 1976-77 season by the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission in Raleigh Monday.

Mandatory tagging for all species of big game (bear, boar, wild turkey, and both antlered and antlerless deer) was also adopted, and will be effective this fall. Hunters should check the 1976-77 regulations for details.

A proposal to shorten the bear season in eastern North Carolina and open it later in the fall was approved with modifications. Instead of different seasons for the east and west, the Commission shortened the season by a week and opened the split seasons concurrently two weeks later than last year to avoid any concentration of hunters. The delayed season will shift the harvest from adult females which den early in November to yearling males which remain active during the winter months. The season, both east and west, will be November 1-November 20 and December 13-January 1. The boar season will coincide with the bear season.

The either-sex deer seasons will remain much the same as last year. There wiii be a one-week season, November 29-December 4, in all of Gates, Halifax, Northampton, Pasquotank, and Perquimans counties and parts of the following counties: Bertie, Camden, Chowan, Currituck, Edgecombe, Martin, Hertford and Hyde.

A two-week, November 29-December 11 either-sex deer season will be held in that part of Buncombe County known as the Biltmore Estate.

STEEL SHOT ONLY The U.S. Department of Interior has announced that Currituck County in northeastern North Carolina will be one of nine areas on the Atlantic Coast where only steel shot will be permitted for use by waterfowl hunters during the 1976-77 season.

The Federal decision to ban the use of lead shot and allow only steel shot in

in nine states was made following recommendations by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, which controls all migratory bird hunting. Pending final action by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, only steel shot (no lead shot) will be permitted for waterfowl hunting on or over the waters and marshes of Currituck County. Currituck County is the only area in North Carolina under the Federal ban on lead shot this coming season. The purpose of the steel shot requirement is to stop the accumulation of spent lead pellets in areas where they cause lead poisoning problems. Waterfowl frequently ingest these pellets and subsequently die from lead poisoning.

## Plea For Typhoon ictims

Residents of Mitchell. Avery and Yancey, the Counties served by the Mayland Red Cross Chapter, are urged to make donations to the fund being raised by the American Natonal Red Cross to assist in relieving the extreme human need created by Typhoon Pamela which sruck the Western Pacific May 20-21.

This disaster received minimal coverage in the news media. Not only did the island of Guam feel the full power of this mighty storm; the islands of Wake, Truk, Tinian, Saipan and Rota also sustained extreme damage and human

Initial damage estimates indicate that 70 to 80 per cent of residential housing, agricultural and commercial structures on each of the islands were destroyed or severely damaged. Power outages and acute water shortages have also affected the island's peoples.

The Guam Red Cross Chapter, assisted by a team of 30 Red Cross Disaster Specialists from Honolulu and the U.S. mainland, is sheltering at least 5,000 Guamanians in 29 shelters on Guam and neighboring islands. More than 13,000 families on Guam alone require immediate assistance from the American Red Cross. To this number must be added at least 2,000 families on Truk Island and as vet undetermined numbers on other islands. Cost of assistance is expected to exceed

Inasmuch as its Disaster Budget for fiscal 1975-76 has been almost expended, the Red Cross is launching a nationwide campaign for \$5,000,000. The portion to be raised by the Mayland Chapter is in addition to amounts included for the Red Cross in the Yancey County United Way campaign and the annual Red Cross drive conducted in
