

Student Council Members Are Elected At Mtn. Heritage

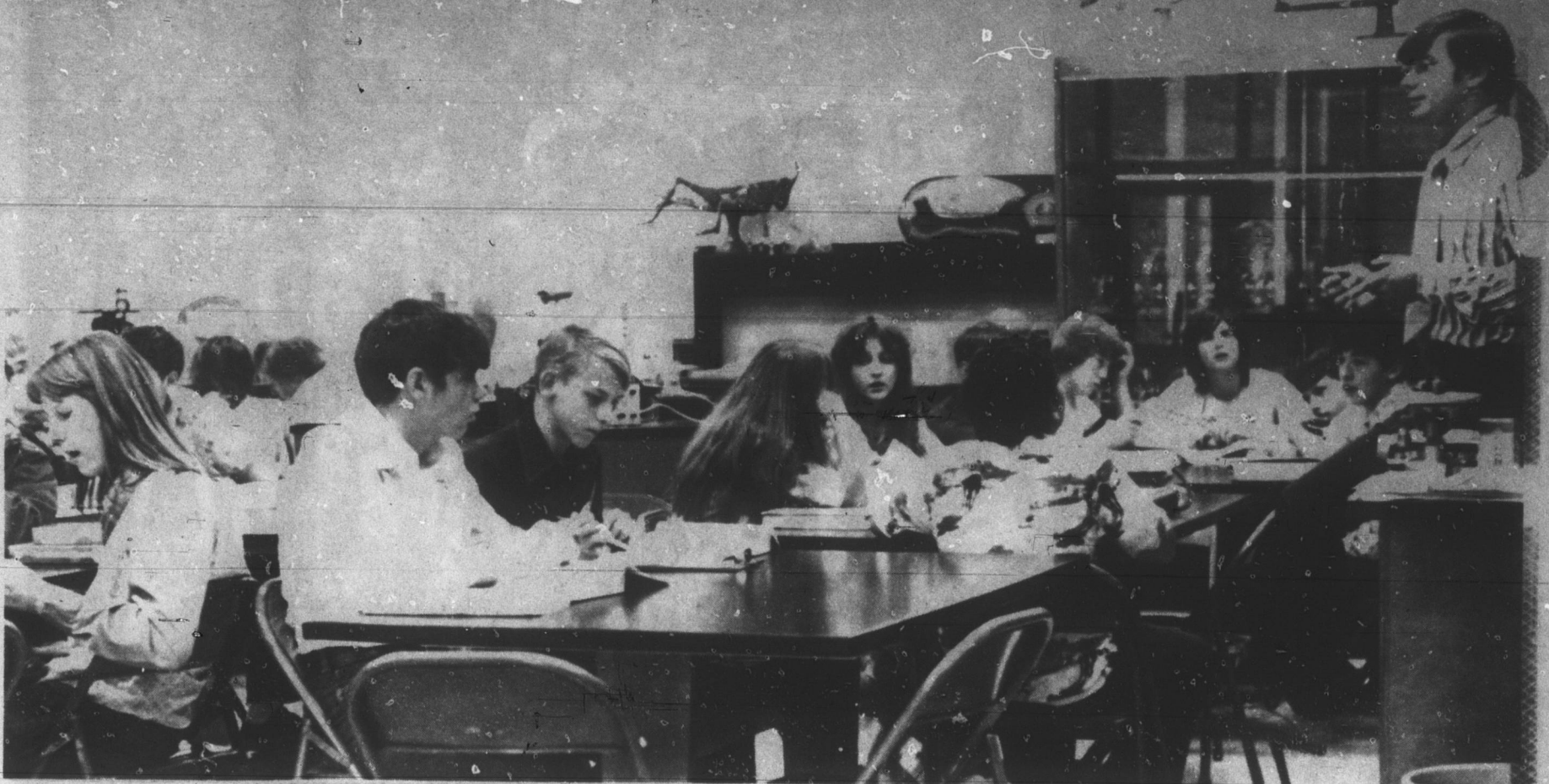

to cry.

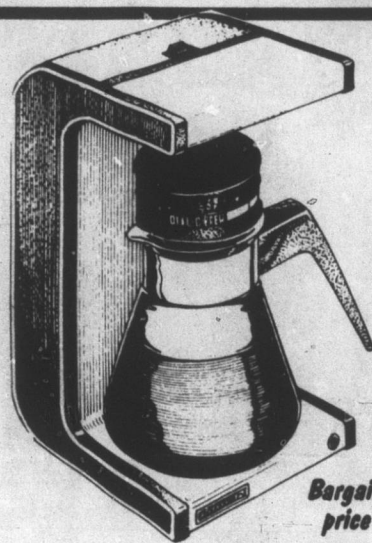
But you are too big to

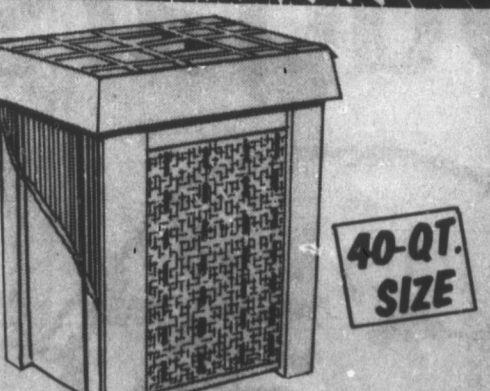
