

Prescription costs go up just 1% since '67

It's time for pharmacists to set the record straight. For years we've been the "whipping boy" of a great deal of uninformed and unjustified criticism about prescription prices. But new statistics prove how this country's pharmacists have held the line on inflation.

From 1967 through 1975 the Department of Labor reports that the average price on prescriptions has increased by only 1% annually. Food, by comparison, increased






