

Dear Editor:



Local GOP Candidates

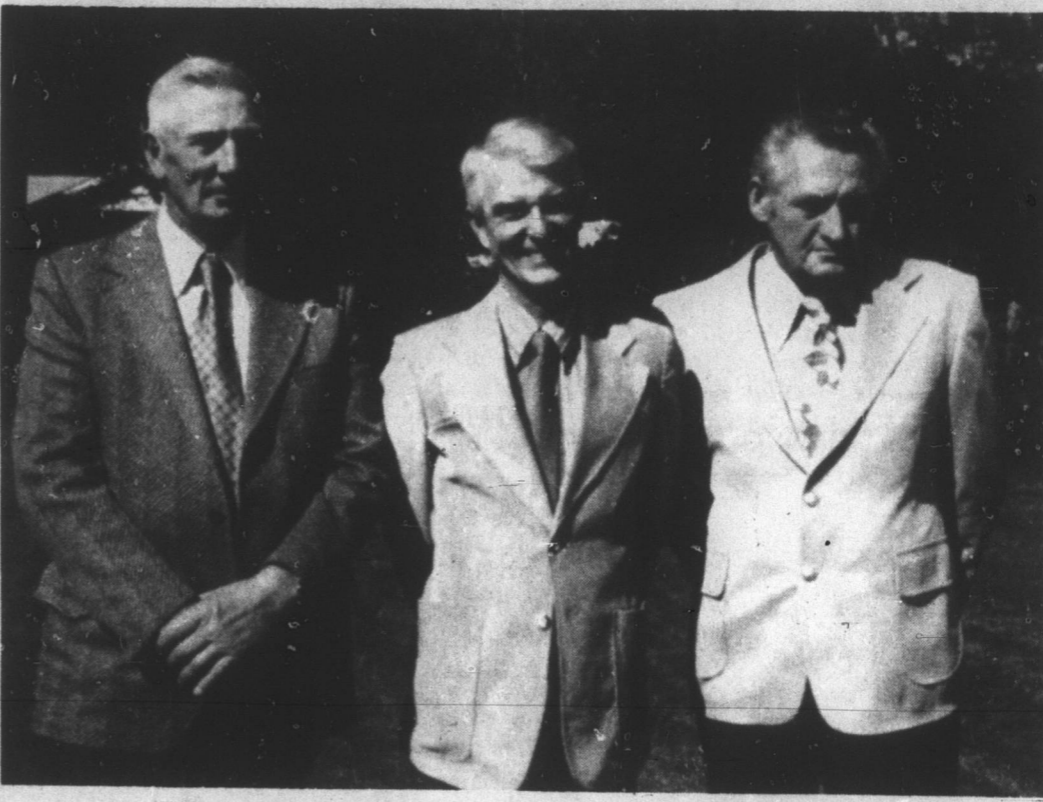

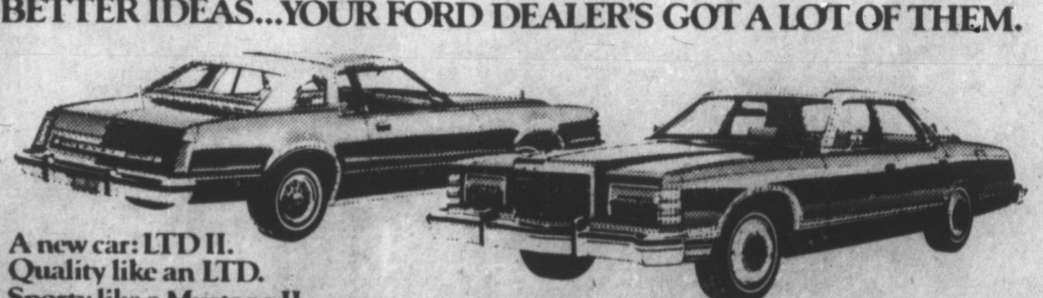
