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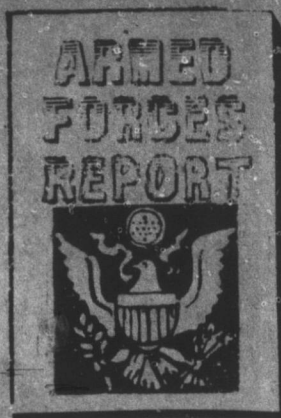

One of the highlights of the Crusade was the appearance of Bishop Festo Kivengere of Uganda. For And About Homemakers

Among your most basic rights as a consumer is the right to information. You have the right to be protected against fraudulent, deceitful, or grossly misleading information, advertising, labeling, or other practices, and to be given the facts to make informed choices in the marketplace. Your right to information is guaranteed by the passage of numerous federal and state laws requiring the disclosure of information or by regulations of agencies established by law. If you do not use the information available to you, you may cheat yourself and your family from the full use of money available to spend, or you may permit injury and other damage from unwise purchases.

YOU MUST READ

To use this information, you must read and use the information provided. Check all labels attached to items you are considering buying--and look for facts.

-What fabric is the garment made of? (Do you know how to care for that fabric?) The law requires a care label. So even if you don't know how to care for a fabric the label tells you.

-On food packages, you can decide how to get the most for your money by looking at the net weight of the product. (Do some simple arithmetic to figure out the cost per ounce, or per pound. The unit price may be on the shelf.) When you compare packages of the same food, you save money by buying the size package or brand which has the lowest cost per unit, if other things are equal.

-The label must tell you the form of the food. Why buy sliced pineapple if you want to cut it up for a salad or fruit cup? Foods processed in smaller pieces usually are less expensive.

-How many servings are in the package? How big is one serving? Buy the size that fits your family, or larger if you can store it.

-Contents of the package, as listed on the panel must show the ingredients in order of descending quantity. If sugar is the first item listed on a package of prepared food, could you save money by adding sugar to a similar unprepared food?

-When you see a product advertised by price, do you look for the size container available at that price? Many products are available in more than one size.

-When buying furniture, how does the label identify the wood or fabric in upholstery? Look for terms you understand that indicate the quality of the product. Would your care of a solid cherry table be different from the care of a simulated cherry grained vinyl surface?

MORE EXPLANATIONS

Instructions on your medicine bottle, explain when to take it and how large a dose is. Do not believe that you will

get well sooner if you take a large dose. On some medicines, drugs, or household chemicals you will see danger signs. Always read these warnings for your safety.

Booklets or folders that come with equipment, appliances, or automobiles should always be carefully read before the item is used. If the product is misused, you may damage it, or find that it does not operate as expected. Your guarantee that it will last and perform as expected is to learn to use the product properly as soon as possible. Don't lose money by not reading!

If the product comes with a warranty, read it carefully to know what you can expect if the product is defective. (Better yet, read before you buy.) File warranties so they can be found when needed.

Learn to criticize advertising by looking beyond emotional appeals for facts about products. Exaggerated claims are illegal. If you know the facts about a product there

will be less cause for disappointment.

READ CONTRACTS ALSO

Before buying on the installment plan, ask for a credit contract to read. Compare contracts from different sources, if you can, to find the terms that suit you best. Learn to look for the annual percentage rate and the total finance charge. You save money when you sign for the lowest percentage rate, if the time for repayment and amount borrowed are the same.

Never sign a contract that is not filled in, or any document that you do not understand. You may accidentally sign away valuable rights.

If you must wear glasses to read, wear them when you shop!

Your right to information is provided by law. Unless you read and use the information available to you, the law is worthless. Make the law work for you every time you shop.

This casserole is a meat, vegetable and rice meal all in one. Follow it with a new way to present instant pudding:
CASSEROLE OF PLENTY
 1 lb. cubed beef
 2 Tbsp. bacon drippings
 2 med. chopped onions
 1 cup celery, cut in sm. pieces
 1/2 cup uncooked rice
 1 cup condensed chicken rice soup
 1 cup cream of mushroom soup
 3 Tbsp. soy sauce
 2 cups water
 1 pkg. frozen peas

Brown onions in dripping; remove from pan and brown meat. Add remaining ingredients and browned onions; place in 2-qt. casserole; cover, bake 350 degree oven 1 1/2 hours. Cook peas according to directions and add to casserole just before serving.

GOOEY PUDDING DESSERT

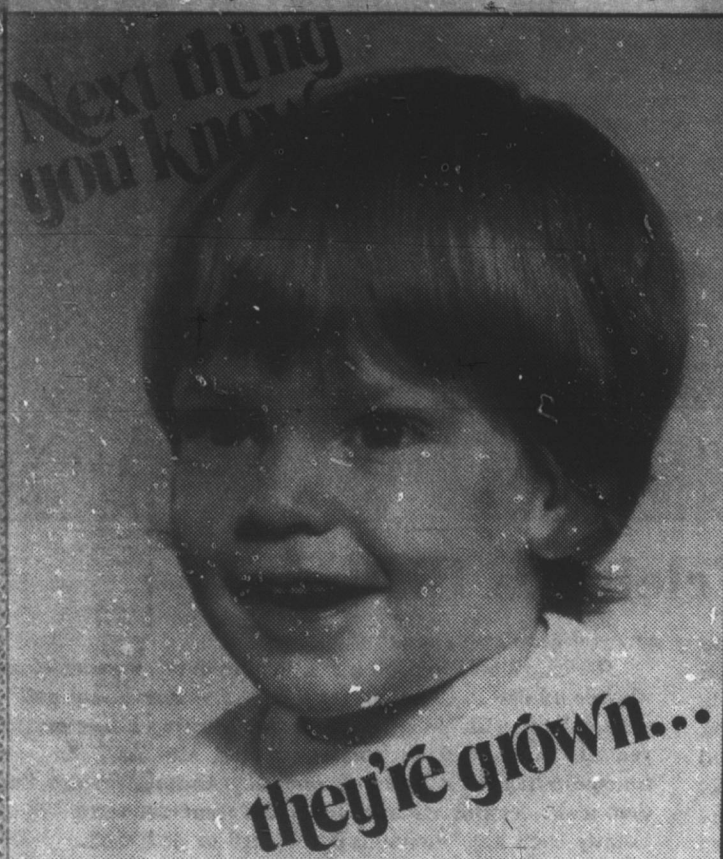
Jane Thomas
