

New Rate Schedules

New rate schedules have been adopted by the French Broad EMC Board of Directors that will be in effect on all bills rendered after January 1. 1978. This rate increase is necessary because of an increase in wholesale power costs to the Cooperative by Carolina Power & Light Company of approximately 7.5%.

Under the regular farm and home residential rate, the monthly minimum charge will increase from \$3.50 to \$4.00.
