Sites For 50 Forest Camps In 14 States Are Selected By **Employment Body's Head**

Washington, April 23 .- Sites for 50 conservation work camps, approved by President Roosevelt, were announced today by Robert Fechner, director of the conservation employment program.

Ten thousand of the 250,000 unemployed men to be recruited under the President's forestation program, he said, will have an opportunity to spend the summer among the scenic national parks and mountains.

They will be scattered through 15 states-Arizona, Arkansas. California, Colorado, Maine, Montana, Tennessee, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Oregon, Utah, Virginia, Washington and Wyoming.

Fechner reported the sites to be utilized included Yellowstone National park, the Great Smokies of Tennessee and North Carolina, the proposed Shenandoah National park area, the Yosemite National park and the Grand Canyon National park.

The first of the camps will be located in the Blue Ridge mountains of Virginia. This area in the proposed Shenandoah National park was visited early this month by President Roosevelt. In that section, also, former President Herbert Hoover's Rapidan retreat is located.


