Soil Conservation News
 Some of the level lands in Cherokee and Clay Counties do not have enough fall to allow the land to be adequately drained with tile lines. In these fields, it is our recommendation that open ditches be used in these fields. To function properly an open ditch must have at least three feet of depth except at the outlet end and in minor "Low areas" were flowing sand is a factor. The side slopes of the ditch should not be steeper than 1:1 to facilitate farming operations and for maintenance of the banks by moving with the available farm machinery.
 We have found that a bottom width of less than three feet will not function as successfully as the three foot bottom in permitting flowage of water in the open ditch; so all our designed open ditches have a three foot bottom width. In placing the spoil dirt from the ditch, we always specify the side that the dirt should be placed so that later the dirt can be spread uniformly over the ground and allow the water to enter the ditch without hindrance.
 After the spoil dirt from the ditch has been spread, the area is harrowed, fertilized, and seeded to fescue at the rate of twenty pounds to the acre. This is the recommended seeding rate for all bands, waterways, and other such areas of land.
 There are a number of places in the area where ditches are used to drain off the excess water so that it can be ascertained if tile drain can be used, if you have such areas on your farm, the Soil Conservation Service will be glad to recommend to you the most effective method for draining - off the water.
 There are several places in Clay and Cherokee County where open ditches have been surveyed and dug for drainage. The Ed Woods Farm at the Airport is a good example of what open ditches can do in Cherokee County. In Clay County, an open ditch was dug on Howard Ford's Farm in Warne across his farm and Mrs. Nora Ford's property to Crawford's Creek. These lines have been in operation for some time and are functioning properly.
 The ACP which is administered by the county ASC Committee, upon your application to them for conservation payment for this practice, can set up a payment to you for the satisfactory completion of open ditch drainage which can equal the payment you would receive on any other conservation practice you might do that year.
