## Grain Program Successful In Clay County

One hundred and thirty four Clay County farmers have signed intention to take part in the 1962 Feed Grain Program. These farmers have already received a total advance payment of \$20,000 for diverting 1,100 acres from the production of corn to a conservation use. This amount represents about one-half of the payment they will earn if their diverted acreage measured up to their intended and if all other terms of the agreement are kept.

Farmers who are interested in participating in the 1962 feed grain program must furnish information necessary to establish a base and payment rate for their farm not later than March 20, 1962. Farmers that have furnished this information and received their notice of base and payment must visit the ASCS office on or before March 30 and sign their intention to take part in the program if they are interested.

## Roving Reporter

We're making Cornbread in Clay County this month. This may not sound like news, at first thought, but let's get the facts.

This month our Junior 4-H Club girls are participating in the "Enriched Cornmeal Muffin Activity." Each girl learns to make muffins, at home for the family, using enriched cornmeal and a standard recipe. On club meeting day she brings muffins to school to be judged against the standard score sheet. Then we have a county contest.

The county winner is selected on the basis of excellent muffins and the best record book on her activity. Mary Evelyn Spurr, of Elf, was our county and district winner and competed in the State Contest last year. We hope Clay County has the district winner again this year.

I have asked our Home Demonstration Club members to use the same recipe, and bring one muffin to club meeting. They are learning to "Make Good Cornbread Better" in this month's demonstration. (Some of the women haven't brought muffins, so I have decided their muffins are so bad they are ashamed of them, or so good that the family eats them all up!)

We have several purposes in teaching the art of Making Cornbread. First, some of the women will be serving as Foods Leaders for Community 4-H Clubs, and they will want to feel competent in advising the girls or judging their muffins.

Second, many of our families eat some form of cornmeal product daily. We think everyone should use only "enriched" cornmeal.

In some communities we find many families using home grown corn which is milled locally and is not enriched. As delicious as it is, it is not adequate in the B vitamins and minerals which are added by enrichment. It was this lack of B vitamins, and lack of "niacin" in particular, which caused the disease, Pellagra, in many Southern a few years past. Today, the wide use of Enriched cereals and flours has all but eliminated pellagra.

But in a few cases, where families still eat a lot of cornbread and grits which are not enriched, there are borderline symptoms that keep some of our folks from enjoying the best of good health. They may suffer from loss of appetite, digestive and skin problems, or even some types of neuritis. I'd better quit before someone asks about my medical degree. But do use "enriched" cornmeal. It will more than pay for itself in better health.

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
