Hayesville Park Committee Holds Meeting With Officials

Saturday night, June 20, a meeting of the Clay County Park committee was called to meet with the board of commissioners and T. V. A. officials, Mr. Richard Record, manager of T. V. A. properties, and Mr. Walter Arrant, assistant manager, in the assembly room of the agriculture building.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the renewing of the 20 year lease which has almost expired on the T. V. A. property, which the county has tried to develop into a picnic park and recreation area.

The board expressed their desire to renew this lease for another 20 years and discussed steps in which some public interest could be created such as beautification, developing more areas for recreation and protection of vandilism. The T. V. A. officials informed us unless the citizens show such interest there is doubt this lease will be renewed.

Clay county is very fortunate in having secured this area for a park and with the help of the citizens could be developed into a beautiful and useful area, that the county would be proud for years to come. The officials also informed the board that the population of the county will be increasing and as we know most

of the lake areas are already taken up so we must not let this opportunity slip through our fingers.

If any citizens have any contributions to make such as money, labor or ideas please contact Mr. W. Q. Moore, chairman. A plan of proposals can be submitted to the T. V. A. in order that we may retain our park area.
