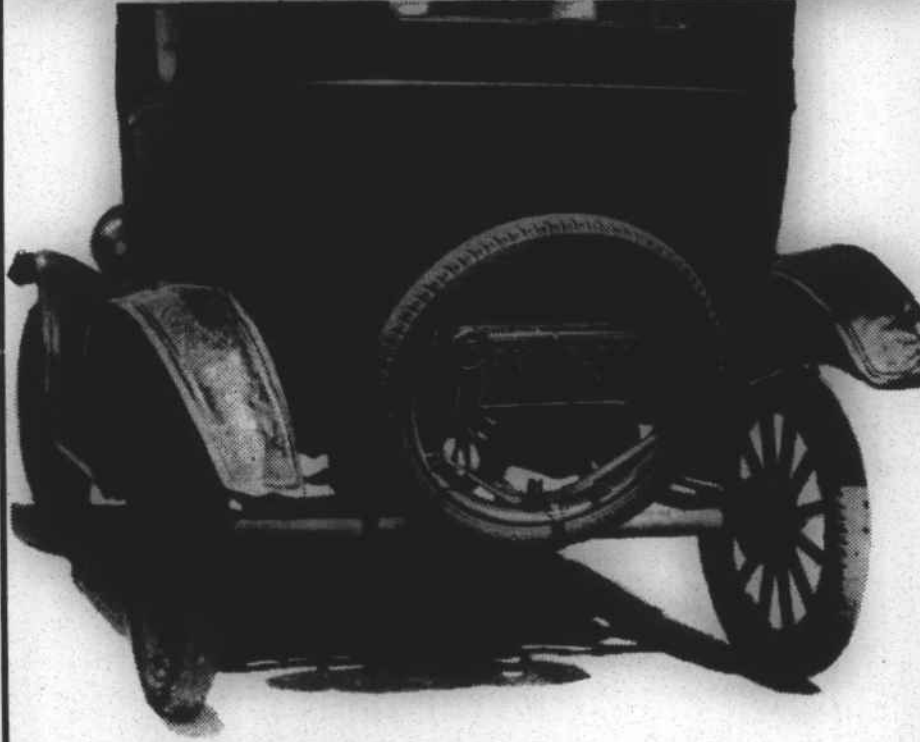
Excellent Spellers Are Told At Ogdin School
