Mr. Long attended the monthly meeting of the Tri-State Rockhounds Club, Inc. in June and was proudly displaying the large specimen. The 12 pound blue sapphire was reputed by club members to be by far the finest and

largest that any had ever seen. One rockhound member said that Arthur Palmer of Marble offered Long \$1,000.00 for the specimen. Wayne Matheson of Andrews said the specimen

was excellent quality with no "junk" on it at all. Figuring 450 grams to the pound, the stone weighs 5,400 grams. At five grams to the carat, the stone totals 27,000 carats.

Unaka Man Dies In Truck Wreck Near Ogretta

A forty-seven year old Unaka man was pronounced dead on arrival at a Murphy hospital around noon Wednesday, June 27, following a truck accident near Ogretta, about 12 miles from Murphy. Leonard McDonald, 47, of Route 3, Murphy (Unaka section) died from head injuries received when the truck in which he was a passenger ran off the road and crashed into a clump of trees.

The dead man was brought to the hospital by John Gross and Van Thomas, who came upon the scene of the accident only minutes after the crash. Thomas reported that the first thing he saw was Dallas Patterson, driver of the truck, and Boyd McDonald, brother of the dead man, dragging McDonald back to the road.

McDonald was picked up and rushed to the hospital in Thomas' car.

According to State Trooper Don Reavis and Sgt. Sandlin, the 1 1/2 ton stake body truck ran 222 feet down the shoulder of the road, ran straight off the road, leaving no skid marks, and came to rest after crashing into a clump of trees. Time of the accident was placed at 11:45 a.m.

Dallas Patterson, 29, is being held at the Cherokee County jail pending an inquest. According to Cherokee County Coroner, J. C. Townson, Patterson was operating a truck with a Georgia tag, with no insurance and no driver's license.

ANDREWS -- Wagons began to roll down U. S.
