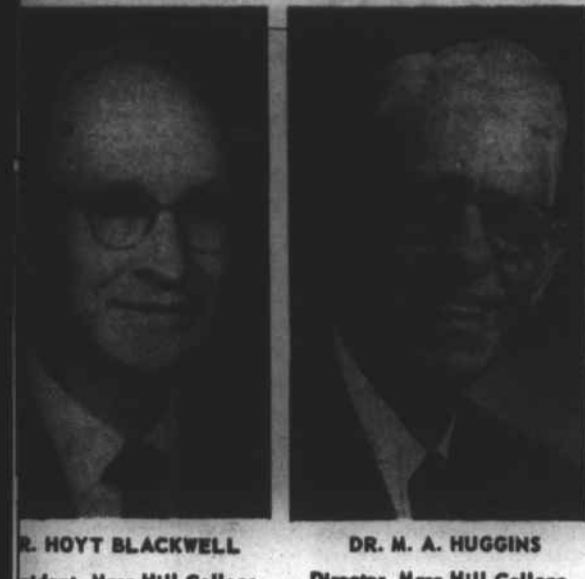
Dr. Hoyt Blackwell will conduct the launching of the Mars Hill College Enlargement Program.

Jeweler Is Death On Copperheads

A. G. Smith, a Cherokee County Jeweler, who lives on a farm in the Martins Creek section with his wife and daughter, Geraldine Ruth, has a pretty good hobby these days - hunting copperhead snakes on his "Holly Hill Farm". Mr. Smith has a record when it comes to killing snakes. This past week he killed 52 copperheads with two shots from his 12 gauge gun. The first shot killed a mother and her 30 young unborn and the second a mother and her 20 unborn. The snakes were killed in the same spot a few hours apart. Mr. Smith has seen several other copperheads within a few hundred yards of this same location. All within a couple hundred yards of his home and barn.

The Smiths are thinking seriously of changing the name of their farm to "Copperhead Paradise." Mr. Smith says he has also killed three rattlesnakes this year with his farm machine in the meadow, and the other with his shotgun.

M. McGough Speaks At Council Meet

Morris McGough of the Asheville Agricultural Development Council Monday at the Murphy Power Board building speaking before a group of 35 community and agricultural leaders said, "We cannot afford to be satisfied." He stated "There must be a desire and a vision of individual Cherokee County citizens to want something better. We need to re-capture the art of working together. The art has been revised in organized communities."

McGough has helped place Western North Carolina in the spotlight in Community Development. Starting with three organized communities in 1950, with his assistance and guidance this has increased to 117 communities in 1962. Community development has now spread to over 1,000 communities in North Carolina. Certain things are wanted by a community. Are you satisfied? If so, then Community Development is not for you.

Two people look through the bars, one sees the need the other the stars. With faith and vision, families can have better things for themselves and their community.

McGough further stated before the group that we must adopt the philosophy that if it's to be it's up to me. Someone must take the lead. We must adopt the vision that it will work in our communities.

There are three enemies to community action which we must watch and they are: doubt, indecision, and fear. These are our greatest enemies. There must be a desire to want something. There is no limit to what a community can do if it wants to.

The meeting was arranged by the joint efforts of the Agricultural Workers Council.

Construction Begun On New High School Building For Andrews

Andrews -- Superintendent of Schools, C. O. Frazier announced this morning that grading has begun on the new Andrews High School building. Final approval by the State Board of Education awarded contracts as follows: General contractor: Smith and Jones of Atlanta for \$169,000 with 240 days time limit. Rogers Plumbing and Heating Company of Asheville for \$16,750 plumbing and \$21,682 heating. Electrical: Hughes Electrical Shop of Murphy for \$15,490.

The one floor building will be constructed of utility brick with classroom walls of surfaced brick and floors of vinyl asphalt tile on concrete. Floors of entry and halls will be of integral terrazzo.

The building will contain 25,160 sq. ft. of floor space. The new building site is a 15 acre tract located one block from the present campus, and will replace the old high school building which was destroyed by fire last February.

Proposed plans call for a second wing to the building which is to be constructed during this building program. Contracts for it will be let at a later date. It will contain a gymnasium - auditorium, a cafeteria and a vocational agriculture department.

C. G. Harrill of Asheville is the architect. Until the new building is completed high school classes will meet in an emergency plant using educational classrooms of the First Baptist and First Methodist Churches and temporary classrooms set up on the old school campus.

At the completion of the building program all high school activities will be housed in facilities entirely separate from the primary and elementary schools.
