Copperheads A. G. Smith, a Cherokee County Jeweler, who lives on a farm in the Martins Creek section with his wife and daughter, GeraldineRuth, has a pretty good hobby these days - hunting copperhead snakes on his "Holly Hill Farm

Mr. Smith has a record when it comes to killing snakes. This past week he killed 52 copperheads with two shots from his 12 gauge gun. The first shot killed a mother and her 30 young unborn and the second a mother and her 20 unborn. The snakes were killed in

the snaces were killed in the same spot a few hours apart. Mr. Smith has seen several other copperheads within a few hundred yards of this same location. All within a couple hundred yards of his home and barn. The Smith's are thinking


