SATAN AND HIS DEVICES
 "For we are not ignorant of his devices" 2 Cor. 2: 11. It is very dangerous indeed to deny the existence and agency of evil spirits, or to consider such topics to be too absurd for discussion. Their non-existence cannot be proved, and the foundation of our faith on this matter is the testimony of the Scriptures. We believe and accept what the Bible says concerning the devil as well as any other subject. We believe the Bible to be the inspired word of God. There are many things in our experience which tend to corroborate and confirm the testimony. There are two mistakes in to which we are liable to fall regarding the prince of evil. On the one hand, we are apt to over-estimate his influence, and think of him as if he were another god. On the other hand, there is the danger of imagining that because Satan is unseen we may give ourselves no concern about him. Among the things which render Satan a formidable enemy is the experience he has acquired in dealing with human souls throughout the history of the race. But we, on our side, may become familiar with his ordinary tactics to ensnare men. His employment of deceitful promises. "He is a liar and the father of it." He deceives by exaggerating the advantages that are to flow from yielding to his enticements, and by concealing the dangers that are incurred. He stivers over the evil things with specious names. A lie is softened into a mistake, an indulgence in intemperance is a frolic, a wasting of the early years of life and wickedness is a "sowing of wild-oats." Infidelity has been re-baptized as freedom of thought. Poison, however you label it is poison still, but the danger is all the greater if it is called a harmless drug. When the wrong picture is being painted to our young people, those that paint them have become the workmen of Satan himself and will have to suffer the results. The tragedy is that innocent people will have to suffer with them. He takes sacred things, and holds them up to ridicule. He represents the Christian life as one of sourness, and talks about "viniger-faced Christians." He soothes the soul to sleep by the repetition of certain sayings, the fallacy of which is not detected. He keeps these sayings in constant circulation. Such as "God is merciful." "There is plenty of time." "A man's belief matters not if he is sincere." But these people that believe these lies will wake up too late one day in the clutches of the devil himself. The one great security against his assaults is to be found in prayer. Satan can never withstand an open Bible and an earnest prayer to God. So let us turn to God and the Bible and not believe everything that we see, hear and read for they may be of Satan trying to twist your arm to get you to do something, by twisting the truth, all the while he smiles.

Rotary Club To Hold Meeting In Andrews
 In Andrews to meet with officers of the local club, James Y. Pharr Jr., Rotary governor of this area, Tuesday night addressed the club at its meeting held at Berkshire area. Mr. Pharr, president of Jones Pharr company of Charlotte, spoke of the internationality of the Rotary organization and the significant contributions Rotarians everywhere are making to the advancement of world understanding and good will. "Rotarians in more than 11,200 communities on six continents," he said, "are helping to draw nations closer together through their efforts to build understanding among men of different creeds and color. They are also at work in the area of public opinion, helping to shape it on important world issues by providing information on which sound decisions can be made." Mr. Pharr also emphasized the importance of the individual Rotarian to the global program of Rotary. "This year," he reminded Andrews Rotarians, "we are urged by our international president Nitish C. Laharry, of Calcutta, India, to develop to the fullest our own capacities for world fellowship and for personal services. Pres. Laharry believes that by 'kindling the spark within' we take the first step toward releasing the latent power in each of us to be of service to others."

Speaking of the work of Rotary clubs in international affairs Mr. Pharr commended the local club for its support of the Rotary Foundation which awards fellowships to graduate students for study in countries other than their own. Since 1947, Rotary International has awarded nearly 1,600 Rotary Foundation Fellowships at a cost of more than \$4,000,000 with the grants averaging \$3,700. The contributions of Rotary clubs make the awards possible.
