WCC To Open On Time

CULLOWHEE - Western Carolina College will definitely begin its fall term on Wednesday, September 5, according to an announcement by Dr. Paul A. Reid, president. This dispels rumors that opening would be postponed because two new dormitories would not be ready.

"There have been some delays," said Dr. Reid, "but we have been assured the buildings will be ready for occupancy when the students report on September 4. Of course, there will be some minor inconveniences to the occupants as finishing touches are added, but the rooms will be ready."

Dr. Reid said completion of the new residence halls, each housing two hundred girls, will bring the campus enrollment to about 2100. All available rooms are reserved, and there is a waiting list for the men's dormitories.

Twenty additional faculty members have been appointed to accommodate the increased enrollment, in an effort to prevent serious overloading of classes. No new classroom space is available, however. Dr. Reid said plans are being worked out for adjustment of schedules to facilitate maximum use of classroom space.

Aside from classroom space, a problem exists in the absorption of four hundred more boarding students into an already over-crowded cafeteria. Additions to the present cafeteria have been requested, but action is necessarily delayed until the next meeting of the General Assembly.

Applications have been approved for 740 freshmen and 167 transfers, a total of 907 new students. They will report to their dormitories on Tuesday, September 4, to begin an orientation program Wednesday morning. The remainder of the week will be devoted to orientation and registration, and classes will begin on the following Monday, September 10.

Standing Indian Camp Site Construction On Schedule

FRANKLIN - Construction of the Standing Indian Camping Area is progressing on schedule, according to U. S. Forest Service District Ranger Howard Burnett. By next spring, this area will offer 32 family campsites, consisting of a waterplatform, table, fireplace, garbage receptacle, and parking spur. This area will be designed for tent camping, rather than trailer or station wagon camping.

Ranger Burnett explained that the Standing Indian development is but one of several recreational developments in the North Carolina National Forests this year. The Forest Service will spend \$350,000.00 in recreation management funds in Western North Carolina in the next year, as part of their "Multiple Use" program.

Eventual plans for the Standing Indian are call for 100 family camping units. This year, 32 units will be installed, along with related service facilities. To date, the access bridge across Nantahala River has been completed; and contracts for a 30,000 gallon water storage reservoir, a 4-unit flush toilet and sewerage system, and gravel for interior roads, have been let. Contracts for 2 additional 4-unit toilet buildings will be let in the near future. Tables and

other facilities are either on hand or on order.

"The Standing Indian Camping Area, being easily accessible from Highway 64 east of Franklin, will be a big help in filling the demand for tent camping facilities in this area," said Ranger Burnett. "The combination of natural beauty and modern facilities in the Standing Indian area will provide the setting for a wonderful camping experience for many families. We of the U. S. Forest Service are happy to be able to provide these facilities, so badly needed here."

Fire Truck Can Not Go Out Of Town

Hayesville--The Commissioners of the Town of Hayesville and members of the voluntary fire department for the Town of Hayesville would like to bring to the attention of all people in Clay County the reason why the fire truck for the Town of Hayesville cannot go out side of Town limits to put out fires. The fire truck was purchased by the Town for fire protection, which also resulted in a reduction of insurance rates in Town, and is being paid for by the residents of the Town of Hayesville for these purposes by Town Taxes. Should the fire truck leave the Town limits to put out fires, these purposes will be defeated since the Town would be without protection while the truck is out of town and also, the fire insurance rates will be increased for all persons living in Hayesville. The Town of Hayesville has already been warned by the N. C. Fire Insurance Rating Bureau that the Town must stop taking the fire truck outside the Town limits. Therefore, it is hoped that the people of Clay County will understand why the fire truck cannot leave the Town limits when called to a fire which is outside the limits of the Town of Hayesville. 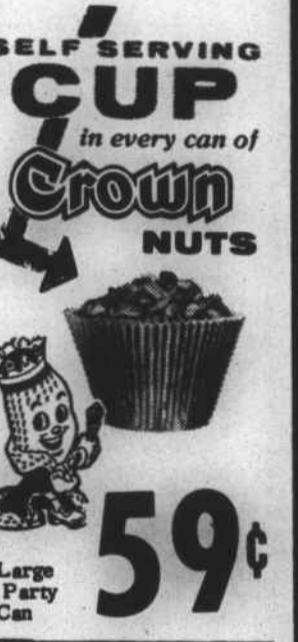
