BIBLE QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Tom Ledbetter Andrews Church of Christ Question: Are we today to follow the Old Testament?

Answer: The New Testament tells us not to do this. Christ said that He came to fulfill the law (Mt. 5:17), and Paul says that He took away the ordinances that were against us (Col. 2:14).

Paul tells us we are free from the law to become part of Christ's body (Rom. 7:1-7), since the law was intended to last only until Christ came (Gal. 3:19, 23-27). He compares Old and New in Hebrews 7, 8, 9, and 10 showing the New to be an improvement over the Old, and to be desired in the place of the Old.

If we seek to be justified by the law we are severed from Christ, and fall from grace (Gal. 5:4).
