

Safety in and on the water and the ability to assist or rescue a person in danger of drowing are based fundamenrescus a person in danger of drowing are based fundamen-tally upon two things, know-ledge and skill, and neither are in itself is sufficent to meet the needs of the indivi-dual. Requirements for this course are very strict. Students must be able to swim at least 440 yards continuo-usly, dive from surface to minimum depth of six feet and swim two body lengths under water, tread water one under water, tread water one minute with hands beneath surface, float motionless or rest in a floating position for one minute, and at least 17 hours of class work.




