Culberson Post Office Seeks Competitive Bids

The Post Office Department is seeking competitive bids

for a new building to house its postal operations at Culberson, N. C. Postmaster General J. Edward Day announced.

Under the Department's Construction Program, a contract will be awarded to the bidder who provides a new building suitable to the Department's needs and according to departmental specifications and then rents it to the Department for a basic period of five years, with two-five year options, or other terms, as offered.

The modernization program by the Post Office Department will make a dual contribution to improving the economy of Culberson, which has been declared eligible to participate in the new Area Redevelopment program of assistance to communities suffering chronic unemployment or underemployment.
