mittee will take no action this year on the conservation fund bill which could have resulted in the charging of admission fees for use of federally-owned park, parkway and forest recreation areas in Western North Carolina, reports Congressman Roy A. Taylor.

Parks Subcommittee, Rep.
Taylor has led a fight agsinst imposition of fees for
the use of the Blue Ridge Parkway, Great Smeky Mountains
National Park, Pisgah and
Nantahala National Forests.
In a neweletter being sent
to some 22,000 persons on the
Congressman's mailing list,
he declares: "I have spoken
out against the proposal; submitted statements against it;
talked with individual members of the committee; and
invited citizens from Western
North Carolina to appear before the committee and testify against the fees,"

"For the moment, we have won a definite victory," said Rep. Taylor.

He warned that the bill "will likely come up sgain during the next session of Congress," and pledged to continue his efforts to prevent the imposi-

tion of any type of fees for the use of federal recreation areas in WNC.
