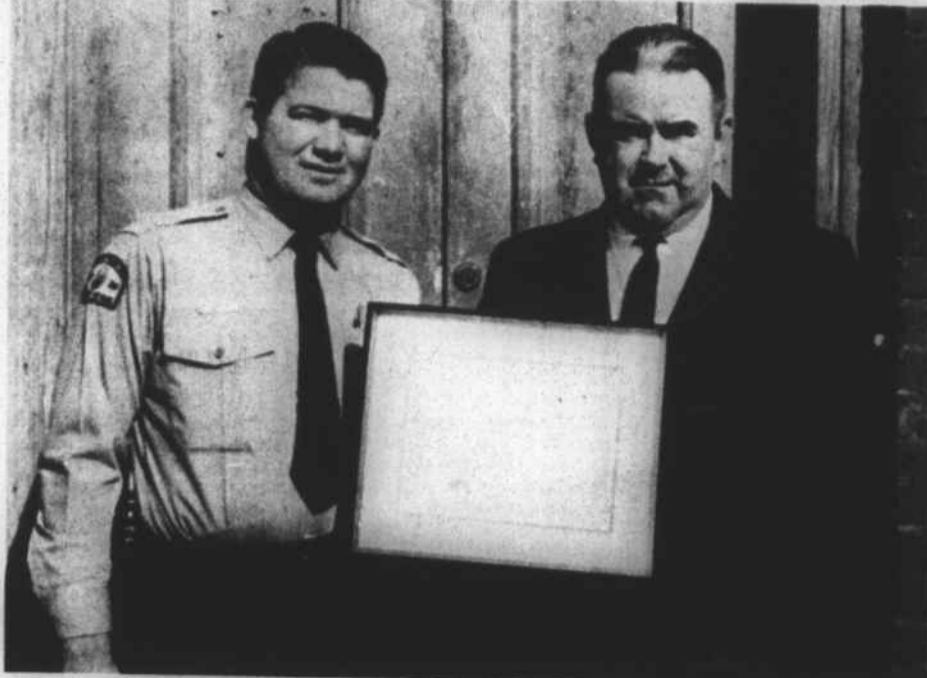
Hayesville Manufacturing Co. Has Christmas Party
