Peachtree Plant Reopens On April Fool's Day

PEACHTREE - The Textured Yarn Co., Inc., plant at Peachtree began recalling workers laid off during January on April Fool's Day, Monday, April 1.

Ronald Ressel, plant manager, said some difficulty was experienced by the personnel staff as they attempted to call the workers back to work. Many took the call as an April Fool's joke. Mr. Ressel reported, however, that all were at their old jobs Tuesday.

Approximately one year ago, Textured Yarn Co., Inc., purchased the plant and property that was formerly the Duffy Silk Co., and later Hemco. The Murphy plant, pictured above, is one of several plants operated by Textured Yarn Co. in the United States and abroad. Other plants are in Pennsylvania, Maryland, and Puerto Rico. The Murphy plant is

located in the Peachtree section of Cherokee County on Peachtree Valley Road.

Textured Yarn Company's Murphy plant specializes in producing textured nylon yarn for use in the rug and carpet industry. "Tycora" is the trademark of the company under which is marketed a variety of yarns for the hosiery, sweater, carpet, and other industries.

According to Mr. Ressel, who returned to Murphy to become plant manager, the plant now has approximately 75 employees, and is operating at 75% capacity. Further plans for expansion are indefinite at this point.
