ELIZABETH CITY - Charles D. Elliott, a native of Murphy, now a State Highway Patrolman, stationed in Elizabeth City, is really on the ball. Failure of two Negroes to cooperate in the removal of auto license plates which had been revoked because of failure to pay insurance got them into trouble.

Trooper Elliott, driving a long Highway 343, a mile from Shiloh spotted the car he was looking for coming toward him.

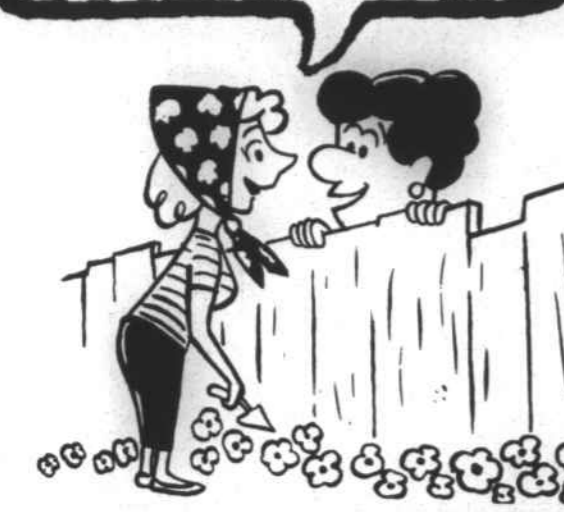
He stopped the vehicle and asked the men to remove the license. When they refused, Elliott began taking the tag off himself, in the process he smelled whiskey. Opening the trunk, he discovered five one-gallon jugs of white lightning.

Cleveland Hughes, 28, owner of the car, and Franklin Tillet, 30, both of Shiloh, were charged with possession of non tax-paid whiskey. Elliott put the ignition keys to the confiscated car in his pocket and summoned a wrecker to pull it in. However, before the wrecker arrived, another Negro jumped into the vehicle and drove off. The trooper is now looking for the guilty party in order to serve a larceny warrant. Hughes and Tillet will face trial in Camden Recorder's Court. This is the latest word being heard around Murphy from two local Naval Air Reservists, Jim Sprung and Hobart McKeever both make the monthly trip to Atlanta Naval Air Station for two days with the Navy. And they both think it's just great! They can't understand why more young men don't take advantage of this program.

Here's what the Naval Air Reservist Program offers: DEFENDERS OF FREEDOM - Inherit a proud tradition when you "come aboard" the Naval Air Reserve, you're joining more than an outstanding aviation organization, you're joining a tradition. A tradition built on honor, sacrifice, and devotion to duty. Naval aviation came into prominence early in World War II, and its success was built on the preparedness of the now WEEKEND WARRIORS. Reservists who were ready, willing and able to join the regulars in defense of our nation and push on to victory.

In Korea, the Naval Air Reserve again called its civilian - sailors to the flag. Their exploits are history, made possible through devotion and honor. When you become a Weekend Warrior you'll serve 12 weekends a year with your friends and neighbors. Your training and dedication will be sharpened each year on the two-week cruise which enables you to put your Navy skills to practical use. And if the need arises, you'll be proud in your knowledge that you, too, are ready, willing and able to defend your nation against all

aggressors.

EDUCATION - In today's modern Navy, you will be given the opportunity to further your education. The annual two-week training duty is usually performed at Navy Air Stations other than your own. Leading squadrons each year are picked to train overseas. In addition, as a Weekend Warrior, you are entitled to travel via government aircraft on a space available basis.

RETIREMENT --- At the moment, retirement is far from your mind. Plans should be made now to insure retirement without financial worries. Your retirement pay will be computed on your active duty base pay at the rate of 2 1/2% for each year of active duty, and approximately 1 1/2% for each year of reserve participation. As a Weekend Warrior, you will have this additional retirement pay at age 60.

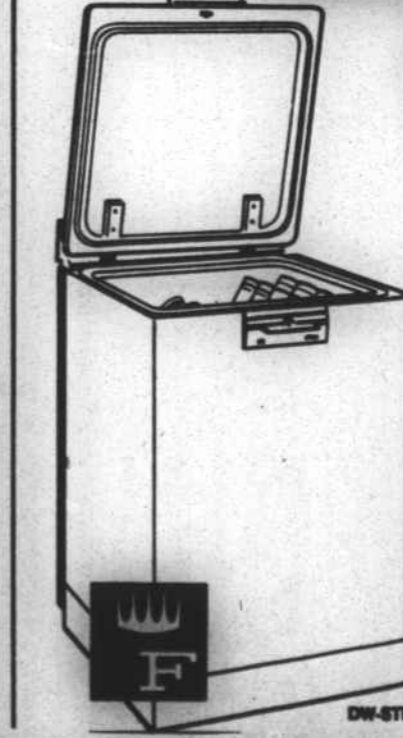
