1955 graduate of Murphy High School, valedictorian of her class, and attended Western Carolina College, After getting her degree she went on to attend Columbia University, New York, Her mother, Mrs. Constance West, was on the faculty of the Murphy City Schools for several years.

In an album recently published by the Vanguard Recording Society of New York, Hedy gives a varied sampling the beauty to be found in genuine folk songs.

Nearly all of her selections in this album are from Western North Carolina and North Georgia.

She learned them from her grandmother, her Uncle Gus Mulkey at Jasper, from old folks around Ellijay, from Tom Fortenberry of Owltown in Union County and other mountain singers.

No place in this country affords a richer source of authentic folk songs than the Appalachian Mountain South. And no part of this area has better materials than the Western Carolina mountains.

It is to this source that Hedy West has gone for both her

"A treasure for the collectors of the authentic style is the latest recording from Vanguard, "Hedy West". This young lady came from a long line of folk singers and sings in the style of the mountain people who preserved the songs they brought with them from England.

"Hedy West accompanies herself on the five-string banjo in a program of considerable variety. . . "Miss West is an extremely talented young lady and if you are among those who value authentic, folk style material, this recording should be very pleasing."

Another critic response, typical of others, came from the critic of the Gazette -Mail (Charleston, W. Va.), who wrote under the heading 'Real Folk Music':

"An Appalachian girl from

North Carolina has absorbed enough of the outside world become a professional musician, At the same time she has genuine roots among the folks.

"That combination makes for superior folk music . . . Her family was among the early settlers of the Appalachians and she is heir to an oral folk tradition passed from generation to generation.
"Besides that she has a

splendid voice with which to sing folk songs. The result is that her record is delightful and without the dishonest pretensions of much contemporary folk music.

About a poem the late Robert Frost wrote: "It begins delight and ends in wisdom," Poet Frost also "No tears in the writer, no tears in the reader," This applies as well to music and song.
