New County Elections Board Chairman Setting Up Jan. 14 Constitution Vote

MURPHY - Hayes Leatherwood, who was elected Chairman of the Cherokee County Board of Elections this month following the death of former Chairman Hobart Hughes, said this week that the election on the 'Little Federal Plan' State Constitutional amendment set for Jan. 14 would be the first test for the new absentee ballot law passed by this year's Legislature.

Mr. Leatherwood was appointed to the County Elections Board in an order signed by State Elections Board Chairman William Joslin following Mr. Hughes' death.

Following his appointment he was elected Chairman of the County Board at a meeting of the three-man Board. Other members of the County Board are Cleve Almond and R. A. Dewar, both of Andrews.

The Constitutional Amendment election set for January 14 will allow voters in the state to decide whether or not the make-up of the State Legislature should be changed to a system similar to the makeup of the Federal Congress.

The Legislature is presently made up of 50 Senators allotted to geographical districts in the state based on population, and 120 Representatives, allotted one to each of the 100 counties in the State, and the remaining 20 allotted on a basis of population.

If the 'Little Federal Amendment' is passed by voters in the state Jan. 14, the number of Senators will be enlarged to 70, still allotted to districts based on population, and the number of Representatives will be cut to 100, allotted one to a county.

In a special session of the Legislature in October, a Senate redistricting bill was passed, realigning districts in the state, giving each of the 50 senators as near the average number of constituents, as possible, roughly 90,000.

Even though the State Constitution requires under the present system that the Senate be redistricted each ten years, following the census, to keep up with shifts in population in the state, thereby keeping Senatorial representation as close as possible to districts of equal population, the bill passed in the special session was the first since 1940.

This redistricting bill will go into effect in 1967 unless the 'Little Federal Plan' is passed in the election Jan. 14. If the amendment passes, the new makeup will nullify the redistricting bill passed in October, and remodel both houses along the lines of the Federal Congress, by basing one house on population and the other on geographical unit.

In the bill passed in October Cherokee and Clay Counties were aligned in a new 38th Senatorial District, with Jackson County added to the old 33rd District to make up the new 38th.

Whether or not this setup ever comes into being depends on whether or not the 'Little Federal Plan' amendment passes on Jan. 14.

New County Elections Board Chairman Leatherwood attended a meeting for elections board representatives from Western counties in Asheville Wednesday for a briefing on the new absentee ballot law which will get a first trial in the Jan. 14 election.

The major provision of the new law restricts distribution of absentee ballots to the persons making the application, except in cases of unexpected illnesses.

The law also provides for reviews of applications at public meetings of local elections boards.

Local boards began processing absentee ballot applications Nov. 30, the required 45 days before the Constitutional election. The cutoff time is 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday, Jan. 8, except in cases of sudden illness.

In a legal ad now running in the Scout, County Chairman Leatherwood instructs all registrars to be at their regular precincts on Dec. 21, 28, 1963, and Jan. 4, 1964, to open register books to eligible voters who are not registered.

He explained that Jan. 11 is challenge day, and that the books will be opened and closed at the hours prescribed by election laws on registering days and challenge day.

The chairman also instructs registrars and judges to be at their precincts on Jan. 14, to conduct the election and process the returns.

Bristol Promoted By Reds

ANDREWS - Dave Bristol, a native of Andrews, a former member of the football and basketball coach staff at Murphy High has been promoted by the Cincin Reds baseball organization from manager of the Memphis Peaches, an AA South Atlantic League team, to manager of the San Diego Padres, a AAA team.

The position for Bristol in San Diego is the highest in league managerial job in organization.

A news release from Cincinnati states that the selection of the 30 year old former Andrews man was made by the Red's organization as a study of the qualifications of all Cincinnati minor league managers and other applicants for the job.

Bill Dewitt, president general manager of the Reds organization said, "Dave Bristol has been a manager in our organization for seven years, has developed several of players who are now on Red's major league club, also will be managing minor league players who have had in past, and we're happy to have someone we feel is capable of taking on this important assignment."

Bristol first became a manager in the Red's organization when he was 23, and since has become the most promising young manager in the organization, moving up in year, and proving to be one of the most productive managers in minor league baseball.

The promotion announced this week moves him up to number two managerial in the entire organization, second only to Fred Hutchinson, manager of the Red's major league club.

Most observers agree Bristol is now slated to be the next manager in the Red's top spot.

Post Office Ready For Big Christmas Mail Rush

MURPHY - Postmaster Joe Ray said today, "Early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is the biggest single factor in getting all of the mail delivered before Christmas.

Post Office facilities have been expanded, ample help will be available, and everything is being geared up to handle a record Christmas mail this year."

The entire Christmas mailing period is a big battle against time. Even though Christmas is a month away by the calendar, it's Christmas every day at the Post Office from now on.

The Postmaster advises, "Don't take chances on mailing poorly wrapped packages. Use sturdy corrugated mailing cartons, plenty of heavy wrapping paper and strong cord. Cartons containing several gift packages should be well stuffed with tissue or old newspapers to cushion the contents."

He said further, "If you have articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the Post Office before attempting to mail them. The limits of size and weight of packages vary, depending on where you mail your packages from."

Always send your Christmas cards by First Class mail, using the new five cent Christmas Tree stamps.
