First 'Wild Hogs'...

19, 1894, died on March 13, 1957, and is buried at the Family Cemetery at the Old Hooper Place. His widow, Mabel Hooper McGuire, still "tends" cattle on the range at the Hooper Bald as did her ancestors over 100 years ago. Her father, Sim Hooper, first introduced Aberdeen Angus (called Black Pole by the natives) cattle to Graham and Cherokee Counties, about 1909. When the registered herd of cattle was unloaded at Andrews, in the presence of a large crowd, a lady suddenly put up her umbrella and this caused a prize cow to lunge, fall, and break her hip! Dr. Robert J. Orr, a skillful surgeon, set the hip with a large copper pin and Mabel "nursed" the injured cow for 3 weeks until she was able to walk and then took her 23 miles across the mountains to West Buffalo, the remainder of the herd having been driven on ahead.

My understanding is that now there are four established herds of the Russian boar in the United States, one in New England, the original one in North Carolina, one in Arkansas, and the one in California, which came from the North Carolina herd. The hogs that Tennessee has been cashing in on the last few years (said Captain Swan) are the hogs that wandered over the state line from North Carolina and belonged to the herd that originally was planted here on Hoopers' Bald.

The lodge that Mr. Moore built was purely for the comfort of visiting sportsmen and not for profit. It was for the purpose of bringing these English people who had capital to invest to the United States, for showing them this section of the country, and for entertaining them up there. There was no charge made for hunting at all.

I was with Mr. Moore from early 1912 until all these installations were completed. It was my duty at that time to transport the animals by ox wagon from Murphy and Andrews to Hoopers' Bald. It was also my duty to build

the wire fences. The split rail fences were put up at the same time. There was never any charge made for anyone that stopped by there to get a meal or to spend the night.

The Hoopers' Bald area was, and still is, so inaccessible that at first the only way we could get in was by pack train --- that is, with pack horses and pack mules. After we got started up there we built a road from Martin's, uppermost farm and house on West Buffalo, to the top of the ridge at the Deep Gap but this road was so steep, Cotton often had to cut a good sized tree and drag it behind his empty wagon when coming down from the Hoopers' Bald in addition to locking the wheels with chains, because his mules and/or horses, were unable to hold the wagon in the road. This part of the road was very rough and steep and on a return trip, the load limit was 1000 pounds for a four horse team.

We always had to have from one to three teams of oxen attached to each wagon, depending on the load it was carrying.

There also was built out from Murphy through Hanging Dog and by Jasper Fain's old place near the Mitchell Lick, a wagon trail so that we could get in to Hoopers' Bald from that side also. It was just a hacked-out, logging-type trail and not a real wagon road--- merely a trail wide enough to get a wagon and team of oxen over.

For a number of years, Mr. Moore supported the refuge on Hoopers' Bald. After he moved to California he sent for McGuire to visit him out there. Cotton was gone about two months and while he was there was presented by Mr. Moore with everything the owner had here in North Carolina, including the animals.

McGuire sold part of the animals to the state of North Carolina. The buffalo were sold to a man named Bill Moore in Andrews and were driven in through the forests the same as you would put a herd of cattle on the road. They finally were killed and eaten.
