"The American Association of University Women in Cherokee County," says Mrs. Ronald Ressel, president, "offers college women an op-portunity to grow intellectual-ly, to help further the advance-ment of women, and to dis-charge their social duties. The AAUW program," she ex -plains, "centers on four areas of interest: Community Problems, Cultural Interests, Edu-cation and World Problems."

The Cherokee County Branch is developing these interests this year by focus-sing on a study of the Orient. The branch also supports the AAUW Fellowships Program, which awards about 100 fellowships each year, with stipends exceeding \$282,000, to women scholars from the United States and abroad for advanced study.
