Sherry, daughter of Mrs. W.C. Vaughan-Lloyd of 7 Woodcrest Drive, and the late Roy Wilson, is the granddaughter of Mrs.

Jake Jordan and the late Mr. Jordan of Murphy.

Sherry has been accepted for the Americans Abroad program of the American Field Service and is the only one of several local applicants to be accepted.

Sherry will live with the family of civil engineer Nicolas Ioannides of the New Smyrna section of Athens. The family spends the entire summer on the island of Aegina, which is one and a half hours out from the Port of Piraeus.

The Ioannides household includes three daughters, Lia, 17; Sophie, 15; both of whom speak English "fairly well"; and Christina, 9. The grandparents on the father's side live with the family but do not go to the island for the summer. The family also has a 12-year-old maid.

Sherry left New York by boat Friday, June 26, and went directly to Athens. She will return to the United States September 16, and will miss the first couple weeks of school.

## Navy Department To Hire Typists And Stenographers

WASHINGTON - The Navy Department in Washington, D. C. has a definite need for civilian typists and stenographers to fill essential positions in its administrative offices. To help meet that need, Miss Vera Williamson, civilian Navy Representative,

will be located at the Navy Recruiting Station, Post Office Building, Asheville, N. C., beginning 6 July 1964. Office hours are from 9:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. on weekdays. Saturday and evening appointments may be made by writing or calling her at AL 3-1931.

Salaries for these civil service positions range from \$3820 to \$4690 a year. Benefits include a five-day work week, low-cost government life insurance, liberal paid vacations and sick leave, group hospitalization and interesting work assignments. Housing is arranged by Navy in advance of arrival.

Applications are being accepted for filling immediate vacancies as well as for openings at a later date. Those selected may be assigned to offices dealing with administration, personnel, medicine, accounting, law, or research and nuclear programs. The necessary requirements are a minimum age of 17 years of age, ability to type at least 40 words per minute and, for stenographers, ability to take dictation at 80 words per minute.
