

Cherokee County Recorder's Court

MURPHY - The July 30, 1964 session of Cherokee County Recorder's Court was held Monday with Judge C. E. Hyde and F. O. Christopher, Solicitor, presiding.

Cases before the court included:

Roy Payne pled guilty to operating a motor vehicle upon the public highways while in an intoxicated condition, this being the third charge, and operating a motor vehicle after his driver's license had been revoked. It is the judgement of the court that the defendant pay a fine of \$1,000 and the cost of the action.

Arsel Stiles pled guilty to aid and abetting in operation of a motor vehicle upon the public highways while in an intoxicated condition. Prayer for judgement is continued for

a period of two years on payment of cost.

Arsel Stiles pled guilty to the offense of failing to make a report to the motor vehicle department of an accident. Prayer for judgement is continued for a period of two years on payment of cost.

William Warren Hedden pled not guilty to the offenses of driving after his license had been revoked and reckless driving. After hearing the evidence the court found the defendant guilty as charged. It is the judgement of the court that the defendant be imprisoned in the county jail for a period of six months and assigned to do work under the supervision of the State Prison Department.

Lewis Killian pled not guilty to the charge of assault with a deadly weapon. After hearing

the evidence the court finds the defendant guilty. It is the judgement of the court that the defendant be imprisoned in the county jail for a period of three months and assigned to do work under the supervision of the State Prison Department. The defendant gives notice of appeal in open court to the Superior Court. The bond for the defendant's appearance at the next term of Superior Court of Cherokee County is set in the amount of \$300.

Harley Coleman pled not guilty to an assault on Lewis Killian. After hearing the evidence the court found the defendant guilty. It is the judgement of the court that the defendant pay the cost of the action.

John E. Whitener pled guilty to operating a motor vehicle upon the public highways while in an intoxicated condition. It is the judgement of the court that the defendant be imprisoned in the county jail for their term of 90 days and assigned to do work of \$100.00 and the cost of this action. The prison sentence was suspended for a period of two years under conditions.

Helen R. Kephart pled guilty to operating a motor vehicle without a valid driver's license. It is the judgement of the court that the cost be paid from the \$35.00 deposit in the hands of the clerk, and that the balance of the deposit be turned over to the school fund as a fine.

Odis Fred Sneed pled guilty to exceeding a safe speed while driving upon the public highways. It is the judgement of the court that the cost first be paid from the deposit of \$35.00 cash in the hands of the clerk and that the balance of the deposit be turned over to the school fund as a fine.

Billy McKinney pled not guilty to speeding upon the public highways. After hearing the evidence the court finds the defendant guilty as charged of speeding 65 mph in a 45 mph zone. It is the judgement of the court that the defendant be imprisoned in the county jail for the term of three months and assigned to work under the supervision of the State Prison Department and pay a fine of \$25.00 and the cost. The prison sentence is suspended by and with the consent of the defendant given in open court for a period of one year under conditions.

Nantahala P & L Is Now Serving 18,128 Customers

FRANKLIN - During the first six months of 1964 Nantahala Power and Light Company has constructed 16.55 miles of rural distribution lines, bringing the company's total mileage of rural lines to 1,866.16.

Also, during the first half of the year, Nantahala has gained 338 additional rural customers, bringing the company's total number of rural customers to 14,758. All customers outside city limits of towns in Nantahala's distribution area are classified as rural.

Figures listing new rural lines and additional rural customers added by Nantahala during the first half of 1964 were included in the company's semi-annual report to the North Carolina Utilities Commission.

At the end of the first six months of the year, Nantahala is serving a total of 18,128 customers.

The memorandum showed the total mileage of new rural lines added in each county during the six months period as Swain 5.51, Macon 4.76, Jackson 2.82, Graham 2.73 and Cherokee .73.

The new rural customers in each county include Swain 103, Macon 102, Jackson 67, Graham 36 and Cherokee 30. The memorandum also noted that 18.48 miles of new rural lines have been approved for construction by Nantahala.
