Harley Coleman pled not guilty to an assault on Lewis Killian. After hearing the evidence the court found the defendant guilty. It is the judgement of the court that the defendant pay the cost of the action.

John E. Whitener pled guilty to operating a motor vehicle upon the public highways while in an intoxicated condition. It is the judgement of the court that the defendant be imprisoned in the county jail for their term of 90 days and assigned to do work of \$100.00 and the cost of this action. The prison sentence was suspended for a period of two years under conditions.

Helen R. Kephart pled guilty to operating a motor vehicle without a valid driver's license. It is the judgement of the court that the cost be paid from the \$35.00 deposit in the hands of the clerk, and that the balance of the deposit be turned over to the school fund as a fine.

Odis Fred Sneed pled guilty to exceeding a safe speed while driving upon the public highways. It is the judgement of the court that the cost first be paid from the deposit of \$35.00 cash in the hands of the clerk and that the balance of the deposit be turned over to the school fund as a fine. Billy McKinney pled not guilty to speeding upon the public highways. Dr. Harold McSwain To Speak To


