that it seems to affect the animal all over. The calf becomes stif and

lame and swelling appears, caused by gas formed in the course of infection. The carcass of the animal is bloated so tight its skin is almost bursting and the two legs on the upper side of the body are pointed rigidly skyward. When the hand is passed over the swellings there is a crackling sound like the crumpling of paper or cellophane. Death occurs within 12 to 36 hours.

The disease is caused by a bacillus-type organism, Clos-tridium Chauvie, which has two stages of life, a vegetative stage and the spore. It is in the vegetative form that the organism grows and causes the disease. In this stage it is anaerobic and is easily killed by heat or chemicals.

When the vegetative form is exposed to air, it produces a spre that becomes almost impervious to destruction, living for years in the soil on vegetative material and resisting heat, cold, and chemicals. The disease is highly contagious. Vaccination is the only ef-
