MURPHY - Girl Scout Cookie time is here again and 200 girls from eight troops began with a punch and cookie rally at Andrews recently to sample their wares and are working toward a deadline of February 15 to get their orders.

This is the annual cookie sale that more than 5,000 Girl Scouts in the 16 Western North Carolina counties comprising the Pisgah Girl Scout Council participate in each year.

A troop certificate is awarded the troop in each neighborhood that sells the largest average number of boxes per girl. Silver disc 100 club pins will be awarded to girls who sell 100 boxes or more and girls who have sold 100 boxes or more for the second or third year will receive year guards for their pins.

It was also explained by the Cookie Chairman for the council, Mrs. L. L. Sneed, of Asheville, that the Cookie Sale is the Council's only means of financing capital improvements and extending camping facilities to more girls.

Each box of cookies bears this message "Girl Scouting Needs Grown-Ups Too." The opportunities for volunteer service are many and varied. More volunteers are needed who could be trainee in the courses planned this spring for troop leaders, neighborhood service team and committee members.
