The Clay County Board of Education has set Thursday, August 26 as the beginning date for the 1965-66 school term in the Clay County Schools. This will be the first day of the regular 180 day term and a full day of classes is scheduled.

Teachers will begin work on Monday, August 23 and work three days prior to the opening of the regular 180 day term. They will work Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, Aug. 23, 24, and 25th. Registration day for the students will be Tuesday, August 24. Buses will operate their regular schedule in the morning on this day. Students will be returned home by twelve o'clock.
