Reports given by District Chairmen and Club Presidents of the 32 clubs represented gave an indication of the excellent work being done by garden clubs from local level to Garden Club of N. C., to National Council of Garden Clubs.

Outstanding guests were Miss Louise Ballard of Waynesville, Assistant Treasurer of National Council; Mrs. W.C. Landolina, Sr., of Clemmons, President of Garden Clubs of N. C.; Mrs. W. B. Blackburn of Greensboro, 1st V.P., and Mrs. L. B. Mills of Laurensburg, 3rd V.P.

Mrs. Landolina reported the progress being made by Garden Club of N. C. Inc., in all phases of garden club work including the progress of Junior and High School gardeners, civic improvements, scholarships to deserving young people and aid to Korean children.

Mrs. Edward L. Lynn, District Director gave a report on the Nation Council of Garden Clubs, convention, held in Portland, Oregon, and stated that the 1966 convention would be held in New Orleans. Mrs. Lynn was elected delegate from District 1 to the 1966 convention. Mrs. Edward Brumby was elected delegate to the Regional meeting in 1966.
