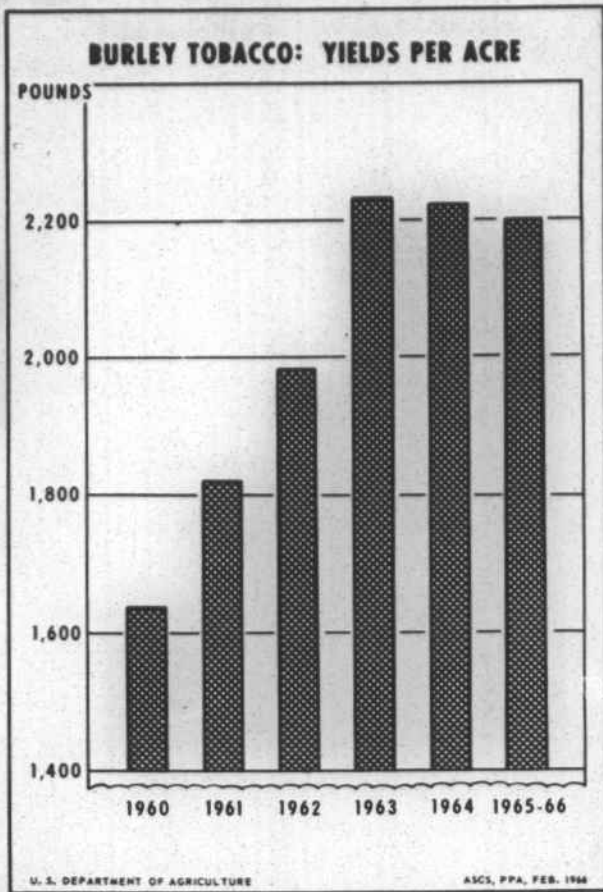

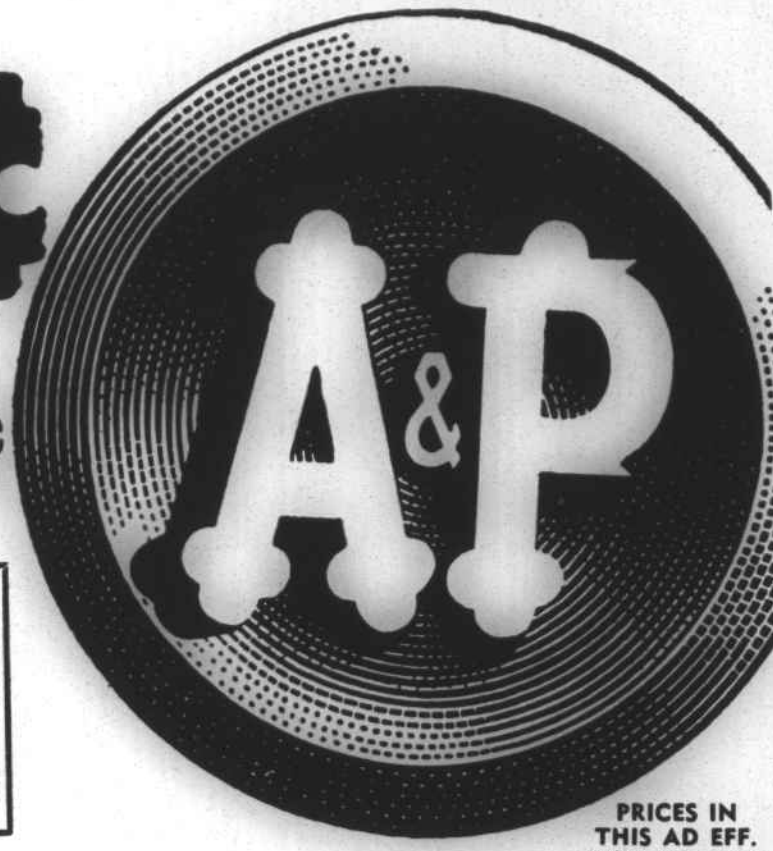

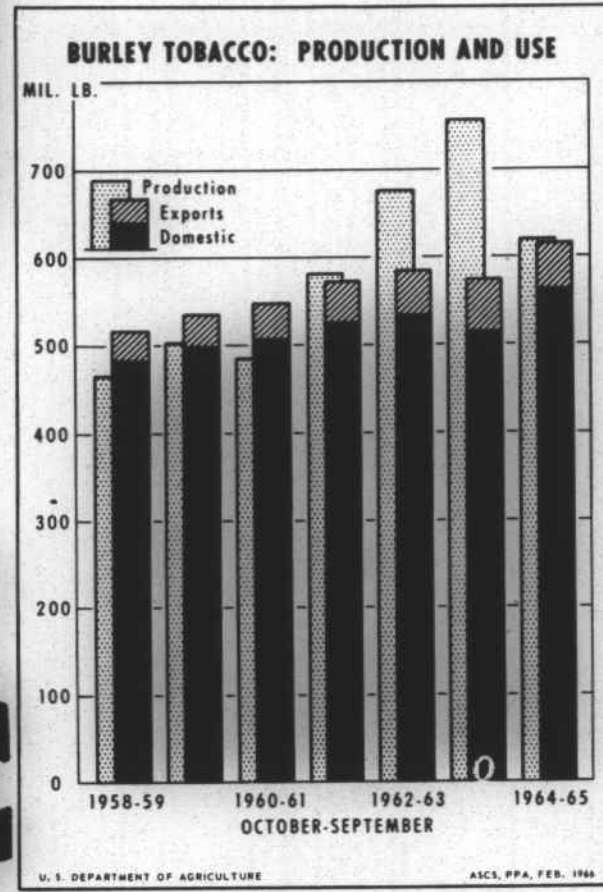

Tobacco producers will decide in a referendum March 10th whether to retain their present acreage control plan or move to an acreage-poundage program.

Speaking bluntly, there is too much burley tobacco. Yield during 1963-65 were almost one third above the period from 1965 through 1960. Last year's acreage cut did not do much to slow production. While the acreage was reduced by 10 per cent, total production was down only 1.5 per cent.

Research and statistics tell us that yields, unchecked, will continue to out-strip production.

Acreage-poundage marketing quotas for tobacco have the following advantages: (1) Acreage allotments will be larger, as the poundage quotas would provide protection against excessive marketings. (2) Each farmer can aim at producing high-quality tobacco without losing part of his share in the market to other farmers who strive for the utmost production from their allotted acreages at the expense of quality. (3) The program has new element of flexibility since farmers can carry over unused quotas from one year to the next. (4) Sales and exports will increase through improved quality. (5) Producer income will be increased because of improved quality, lower production costs and the fact that the tobacco supplies are kept better in line. (6) Supplies of tobacco will be kept in better balance with demand, with less cost to the Government.
