People & Issues



SHAD BAKE. . . . Politicians from all over North Carolina will be converging on Aberdeen this Friday afternoon, April 29, for the Town of Aberdeen's annual Shad Bake honoring State Highway Division Eight personnel. A prelude to the Shad Bake will be the A&R Railroad's social hour at the American Legion Hut from 4:30 to 5:30 o'clock, followed by the Shad Bake at the Aberdeen Lake.

Forrest Locky, president of the Aberdeen and Rockfish Railroad, former Aberdeen mayor and highway commissioner is the spark plug in the event where politics is always a prime topic. Jack Taylor is Aberdeen mayor.

ISSUES. . . . In talking with legislative candidates with opposition in the May primary we learn that "brown-bagging" and automobile inspection are the two subjects most voters seem to be concerned with. Oddly enough, they said that very little interest was being manifested on the "Speaker Ban" law.

A veteran legislator suggested that the right candidate could be elected governor in 1968 by running on a platform used successfully by the late Governor J. Melville Broughton in 1949—"take the tax off the table."

KKK RULING. . . . While we hold no brief whatsoever for the Ku Klux Klan, we feel that Judge William A. Johnson made sound ruling when he declared that the temporary injunction restraining the Klan from holding a meeting near Maxton could not be made permanent.

The First Amendment to our Federal Constitution is very explicit and clear on the matter, saying: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech or of the press; or the right of the people peacefully to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances."

TOM WHITE. . . . Senator Thomas J. White of Kinston is a controversial figure in state politics, always willing to take his stand, even though he may stand alone—as he has at times. But back home in Senate District 5, composed of Greene, Jones, and Lenoir counties no one dared take him on in the Democratic Primary so he will be back in Raleigh as a powerful figure in the 1967 General Assembly, probably again heading up the powerful Senate Appropriations Committee.

HOT RACE. . . . In the 32nd Senatorial District a hot race appears to be brewing between Senator Oral Yates of Haywood who has served in the Senate during the 1963 and 1965 sessions and Harry Buchanan of Henderson County. Buchanan was a member of the Highway Commission under Governor Umstead. Both are veterans at the "great game of politics".

UNUSUAL. . . . In the big counties like Wake with multiple representation in the House and Senate it is rare when a candidate gets by without opposition. But, Senators Ruffin Bailey and Jack Goggins got by without primary opposition and can look forward to another term of Senate service, free from primary campaigning, which both saw plenty of two years ago.

ED HAMLIN. . . . Ed Hamlin, longtime publisher of the News of Orange County and now a candidate for Clerk of Superior Court in Orange has sold his newspaper to Orville Campbell, publisher of the Chapel Hill Weekly. Ed represented Orange in the 1963 special session of the General Assembly when he was named to succeed L. J. Phipps who gave up his seat to serve as State Commander of the American Legion.

UPCOMING MEETINGS. . . . Dates for the Democratic precinct, county and state conventions have been set as follows: Precinct conventions, Saturday, May 7; County Conventions, Saturday, May 14; and State Convention, Thursday, May 19.

There is a feeling among some party leaders that the county and state executive committees are too large and that if they could be reduced in size that they would be more efficient.

HARMONY. . . . With no hot statewide races on hand and with no national delegates to be selected, the state convention should be a very harmonious affair.

PAUL KITCHIN. . . . Paul Kitchin will be the Democratic keynoteer at the May 19 state convention.
