## Shirley A. Ford Graduates At Mars Hill College

Shirley Annette Ford was among the 193 students awarded degrees at Mars Hill College last week. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Robert Ford of Hayesville. Miss Ford received a Bachelor of Arts Degree in elementary education.

A record crowd of nearly 1800 persons witnessed the graduation exercises in Moore Auditorium on the campus. They heard Dr. Fred Bentley president-elect of the college, address the graduates. In a speech entitled "Getting Ahead—Ahead of What?" he cautioned the graduates to be sure their goals in life challenge their abilities.

"It is myopic," he said, "for us to simply do a little better than the man next to us; rather, we have to dedicate our entire lives to the pursuit of knowledge, to the development of our whole being."

"If we give our all to a particular task or situation," he explained, "then, after a few years, when we pause to take stock of our lives, we will find we have spent our years wisely."

Earlier the members of the graduating class and approximately 1200 visitors and guests had heard the Rev. Ben C. Fisher of Raleigh, executive secretary of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention's council on Christian education, preach the baccalaureate sermon.

The Rev. Mr. Fisher reminded the graduates they are "...called to be instruments of God's action, to be channels of His love."

Basing his sermon on a passage from "The Words," a self-analysis by the influential French writer-philosopher Jean-Paul Sartre, he told the graduates how to avoid becoming "a traveler without a ticket."

Dr. Hoyt Blackwell, who will retire June 30 after 28 years as president of the 110 year old Baptist school, also had a few words for the graduates.

"The measure of your success in life," he said, "will be the success of your devotion to God as expressed through service to mankind everywhere."

He received a standing ovation as the program ended.

### FIELD WORK

During the month of June we expect to get in full swing on our field work. Reporters will be in the field for the purpose of measuring feed grain, tobacco, wheat and CR farms. Compliance checks will be made in connection with all programs.

In connection with our regular work this year we are in the process of locating all farms on the photographs and determining the cropland and pasture acreage for each farm. This work has been completed on 550 farms.
