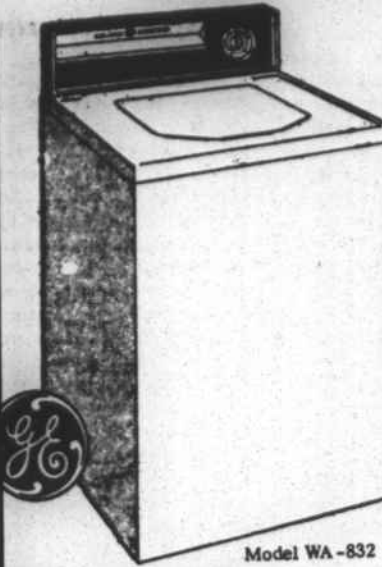
Jewell Lee Withrow plead not guilty to non support of his wife. He was found guilty and ordered to pay the costs. A 12 month prison sentence was suspended.

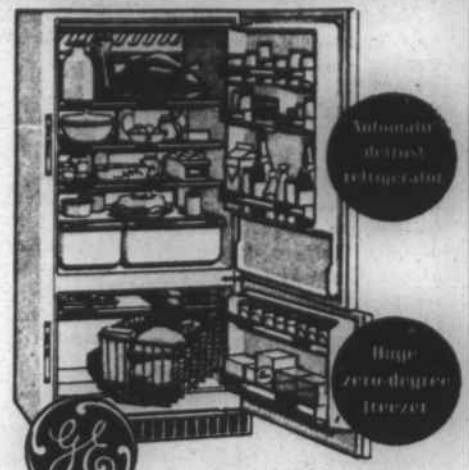

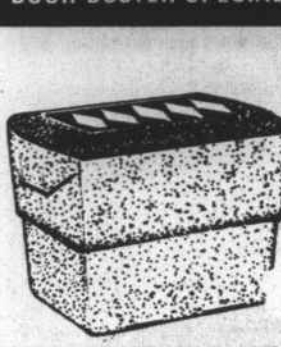
