Harry Clarke, president of Western Carolina Industries, Inc., was the main speaker. He discussed factors that communities need to develop in order to attract new industries

and enterprises. He said the most important factor is to treat existing industries well. Day announced that the next quarterly meeting of the commission will be held in August in Waynesville.

Harvey, Shallcross Address Clay Republicans; Bradley Named District Chairman

Congressional candidate Scott Harvey told Clay County Republicans Saturday night that a change in Congress can pave the way to reduction in taxes and a halt to the rising cost of living.

Addressing a barbecue at Hayesville, Harvey called the rising cost of necessities a form of taxation that "does a great disservice to the poor." He claimed both the Johnson and Kennedy administrations endorsed an inflationary trend.

Harvey told the Clay County group that if they voted for him they would be voting to organize a Congress "which will not be a rubber stamp for Johnson and his poorly considered schemes."

Republican senatorial candidate John S. Shallcross also attended the barbecue and called on Clay Republicans to help in his effort to unseat Senator B. Everett Jordan in November.

In another political development, Clay Republican Chairman Bill Bradley has been elected district chairman. He replaces Bruce Briggs of Asheville who is running for the State Senate.

SUNDAY'S SERMON

EXAMPLE

Just as one picture is worth a thousand words, there is no substitute for parental example in the proper business of "bringing up" children.

Parents who often complain their children do nothing but "fuss and fight" overlook the fact that their own bickering sets the family pattern.

The children in a family must have respect for their parents before they are likely to have respect for one another. If parents are disagreeable, they create an unpleasant environment within the home.

Parents who do not maintain a certain amount of parental dignity suffer a loss of respect. Parents who are inconsistent, in their attitude towards one another, and towards their children, will find their children becoming more quick to question their authority and the wisdom of their decisions.

Parents should evidence mutual respect and trust. Setting an example is accomplished through a course of action and there is no merit in saying, "Don't do as I do; do as I say do."
