The North Carolina Forest Service reminds landowners that a burning permit is necessary for all burning in or near woods in the period that Four-Square, announced that started on October 1 and ends on lune 1.

> Burning permits can be obtained from the County Forest Ranger or the District Office in Sylva.

A report has been issued on the activities of the N.C. Forest Service in District Nine during the month of September.

Sixteen requests for Forrest Management Assistance from private land owners were serviced. A total of 491 acres of land was examined and management recommendations presented to the owners

The report revoiled that 94 acres of timber in the district was selectively marked and estimated to contain 230,000 board feet of sawtimber and 28 cords of plywood which will be sold in the near future.
