The table was covered in white with candles entwined with vine at each end. A three-tiered wedding cake with swan deviders and a miniature bride and groom was the centerpiece.

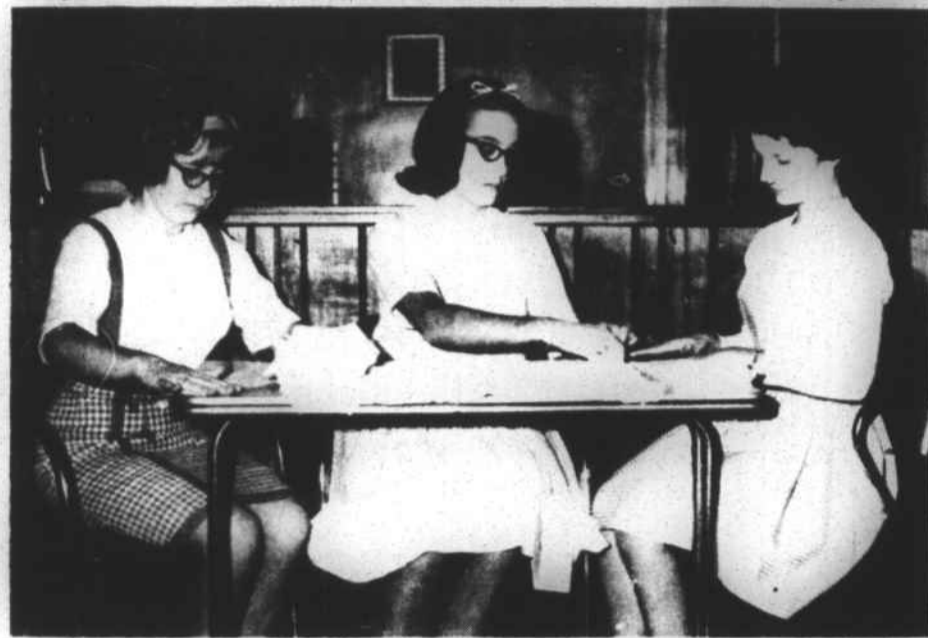
