**Rural Carrier Exam Open**

An examination for Rural Carrier for the post office at Hayesville, N.C. will be open for acceptance of applications until April 11.

Applicants must take a written test for this position. They must have resided within the delivery of the office for one year immediately preceding

the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. There is no maximum age limit. However, persons who have passed the age of 70 may be considered only for temporary limited appointments of one year.

All qualified applicants will receive consideration for appointment without regard to race, religion, color, national origin, sex, politics, or any other non-merit factor.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with U.S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D.C. 20415, and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.

There will be a senior citizens meeting Friday afternoon at 2 at the Hayesville Health Center.

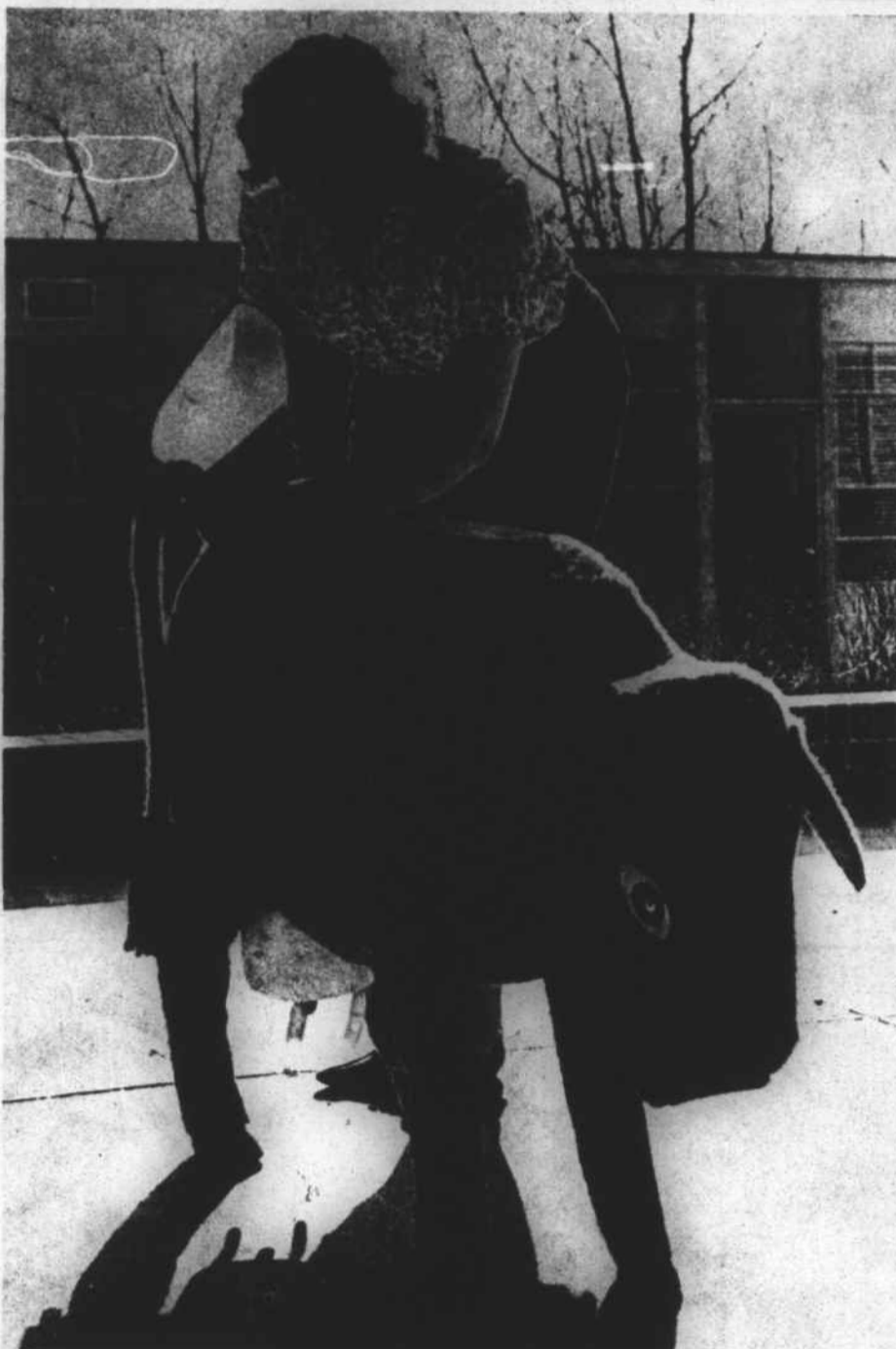
All persons over 60 years of age are invited.

**ASCS News**

**BURLEY TOBACCO**  
A total of 340 Clay County growers voted in the recent burley tobacco acreage poundage referendum. Of those voting, 291 favored changing to the acreage-poundage program, and 49 opposed the change. This was 86% "yes" and 14% "no" votes.

However, voters throughout the burley belt did not cast the required percentage of favorable votes to change the program.

North Carolina producers rejected the proposal to change from the acreage allotment program to an acreage-poundage program. The 63.9 percent "yes" vote was short of the necessary 66 2/3 percent majority votes needed.

Other State percentages are not available at this time, but the over all "yes" vote fell far short of the percentage needed to put the acreage-poundage program into effect.

The effective farm allotment for 1967 will be the acreage shown under "L Acreage Program" on left of allotment notice received in February.

Farmers wishing to have their allotted acreage measured and staked prior to planting, may do so by filing a request and \$8.00 deposit in the county office by April 15, 1967.

**DIVERSION PROGRAMS**  
The sign up to divert corn land under the 1967 feed grain program ended on March 17. It is estimated that 225 farms will divert 1300 acres from the production of corn to a conservation use in 1967.

The sign up to divert acreage under the 1967 Cropland Adjustment Program ended March 3, 1967. Eighteen farmers filed request for agreements under this program. Nine requests have been withdrawn. The remaining producers will have an opportunity to enter into agree-
