State FHA Officials Make Inspection Tour

Melvin Hearn, North Carolina Director of the Farmers Home Administration, led a State FHA Advisory Committee on an inspection tour of Clay County last

Thursday. County FHA Supervisor Phillip J. Howell, Assistant County Supervisors Mrs. Virginia Anderson and Joe Woodard, Rural Renewal Program Leader Mack B. Ray, and Cherokee County FHA Supervisor R.D. Bruce accompanied the group.

Other members of the delegation were Paul Laughrun of Asheville, District Supervisor for FHA in 15 western North Carolina counties; Dr. Lem Stokes, chairman of the State FHA committee and president of Phifer College at Misenheimer; and Mrs. Gilbert R. English of Trinity, Bruce Eaker of Wooddale and J.L. Parker of Colerain, members of the State FHA committee.

Hearn expressed pleasure with the work being done by the local FHA office.

Howell showed the group figures for the fiscal year ending June 30. A total of 150 loans were made in Clay County for 4969,280.

The tour began with an inspection of the Hayesville Homesites which are now under construction. There was a visit to the site of the proposed Chatuge Shores Recreation Project and several individual FHA borrowers.

A lunch and discussion session at the Hinton Rural Life Center ended the tour.

216 Receive Eye Care Treatment

A total of 216 individual eye care services were rendered in the 1966-67 fiscal year through the cooperative efforts of the Clay County Lions Club, the N.C. State Commission for the Blind, the Clay County Health Department and the Welfare Department.

There were 113 eye examinations. Sixty-two persons received glasses. There were 38 treatments and three surgery cases.

ICYE came into being soon after the Second World War when German youths came to live a year with American families. This year about 500 teenagers will be exchanged among the participating nations.
