## Bank Plans Merger With First Union

The board of directors of Citizens Bank & Trust Company at their regular meeting at 2 p. m. Tuesday, voted to merge with the First Union National Bank of Charlotte, subject to the approval of the Comptroller of the Currency and the stockholders of both institutions.

Total combined resources of the two institutions will be in excess of \$850,000,000.

First Union National, headquartered in Charlotte, operates 14 offices in 50 North Carolina communities.

Percy B. Ferebee, chairman of the board, stated that there will be no change in the personnel at any of the branches as a result of the merger. He said all employees will continue to serve as they have in the past and these banks will be under the supervision of the same authority as they are now, Citizens Bank & Trust Company's main office is in Andrews with offices in Murphy, Hayesville, Sylva. Cullowhee, Robbinsville, and Cashiers.

Citizens Bank & Trust Company was organized by R. T. Heaton and D. W. Mehaffey on Oct. 14, 1924, with \$15,000 capital and no surplus or undivided profit.

The bank operated as a unit bank until 1931 when another office was opened in Murphy, Two previous banks had failed and closed in Murphy. A few years later the bank opened an office in Robbinsville which had had a bank that also failed. Later an office was opened in Havesville which also had a bank that failed and was closed.

The bank has more recently opened offices at Sylva, Cullowhee, and Cashiers, They also have on file an approved application for an office in Franklin,

As of June 21, the bank had a capital of \$600,000, a surplus-of \$1 million, and an undivided profit of \$316,867,42 making a total capital and surpuls of \$1,916,867.42. Total resources on that day were \$27, 856,137.

Ferebee stated that he asked for the merger because the industrial growth of the area served by the bank in the last 10 years has been tremendous and that in his opinion, it is just beginning to realize its potential. 
